

Monte Verde May 5th 1861

My Dear Dr.

I don't know that I wrote you<sup>\*</sup> that returning from Bayamón my pack-horse had a very sore back & I left at Bradford (*Peltophorum*) my dried plants - two large bundles. On the receipt of your letter of Dec 28 in which you ask why I do not send on the plants collected at Mayagüez. I wrote to Bradford begging him to send said two bundles to Cuba. He didn't get my letter of Jan'y 28th till in March when he complied with my request. From Cuba the plants have been brought as far as Nouvelle Sophie & I may now look for them here any day. But I think as I shall come home myself before long it will not be worth while to spend time which can perhaps be better employed in getting these things to the place of shipment just now. I am making arrangements to go to Ponce & shall probably set out in a few days. A few days ago I went to Monte Yoro (*Tauroa*) & spent one day & a half botanizing & conchologizing. I did very well in both branches. Of the *Ranunculus* of which I sent a leaf I got specimens in abundance & good. I suppose it is the ubiquitous *R. repens*. It is truly indigenous. I found a new *Cestrum* & a *Siphoria*. *Erythroloma* - very distinct from No. 553 - a *Karwinskia* - a *Lyonia* not answering the descriptions at hand.

my books - several Melastomaceæ - ditto -  
two Aristolochias (not A. Archonticona L.) & some  
peppers which I can't make out among them a  
Microsiphon - a very little delicate thing - also

I have I think acknowledged the receipt of your  
last Ap. 2 but don't answer it. "We had better  
not worry each other about the secession ~~intelligible~~"  
A very good beginning yet you go on for a couple  
of pages partly alarms of the south - partly in  
defense of the north. I doubt if I thought it  
worth while give you as good as you send  
Suppose it that I am a secessionist. Let then  
that will live under your old ~~old~~ <sup>old</sup> ~~effete~~ <sup>effete</sup> constitution.  
It was very good in the time of Washington &  
Jefferson &c. when men were honest. As for  
me that of the Southern Confederacy pleases me  
better. Abolish all privileges reduce the pay  
of your legislators in half & you'll have  
more & better legislation & you'll keep out  
of debt. And be sure you provide for the  
kick-backs that the Presidents may have some  
time to devote to the interests of the public &  
not be tormented to death by such vermin  
as swarm about him "chercheur des places"

But your heart is in this matter as mine  
is & it is difficult not to talk & write as  
well as think about it. We have the news down  
nearly to the middle of Ap. Then all was warlike  
preparation. The Pres. agreed vacillating all  
the month of March & crying peace! peace! sud-  
denly sends off all the naval forces that  
could be mustered with sealed orders. Up to  
this time we know not the object of all this

naval movements nor when the blow will  
fall but to me it looks all bad all wrong.  
I dread to hear the result.

6th Today I found a juglans - a large tree 57-60 ft high  
Seaglets 6 pair oval-lanceolate irregular. For a little  
more than an inch in diam. - probably J. cincerea

9th Yesterday I got a glorious <sup>handsome</sup> ~~handsome~~ <sup>handsome</sup> ~~handsome~~ <sup>handsome</sup> ~~handsome~~ <sup>handsome</sup>  
however last Mr. Lescaille for the first time - little  
else. I hope to be off today or tomorrow for Baracoa  
The rain yesterday prevented my guide from com-  
ing according to appointment

I have borrowed some money of Mr. Z. Please  
send ~~me~~ a certificate of deposit for \$50.00 in his  
name. Direct the letter to him without my name  
on the envelope or he will not open it. You can  
put within it any note you may have for me  
Frederick Lescaille - observe the orthography which is  
often a matter of importance

Probably you had better not write to me after the  
end of this month as I shall embrace the first good  
chance of returning home? after my return from  
Baracoa.
