

Nouvelle Sophie 24 Nov. 1861
My Dear Dr.

The 20th I set out on my journey which if I am prospered will end at least for a time at "la Habana". At Saltadero I got your letter or letters of the 7th & 25th ult also the paper on the mosses. One third "more sp." is encouraging. Who would have thought Fissidens would turn out so many novelties. I have many a time passed the the upturned clay root on which Nos 17 & 19 were found one on the east side one on the west. I remember perfectly that they appeared to me distinct & I put them up separately. How queer it is that the two sp. of the same gen. should grow each by itself yet separated only by a ridge of earth a few inches in thickness. This report stimulates me. If Salt. had known which side his bread was buttered & had given me long ago a small fraction of the satisfaction which this report gives me I doubt not his coll. would have felt its influence.

Eaton has forwarded me a box of clothing prepared by my sisters to which he has added some things a list of all which he has sent me — but he says from Vinay or Lyon H. Brit M. M. I. I guess he has forgotten it. Well — I don't just now feel "growly".

If you have got my letters you know why I did not send by "that Boston vessel" I chanc'd "run" into Saltadero so easily as you do into Boston & trusted to the word of one of the Mrs Brooks for notice of the sailing of a vessel. The Couphore meanwhile went to Cuba or elsewhere or I didn't receive the promised advice. The road have been execrable.

I can't call to mind the looks of Sphinctanthes longiflora, Schradra cephalophora I remember well. The coll. now on the way

home if not already there will give you more
perhaps enough of *Douglasia*. If not I can
get a plenty more. The new *Luziaanthus* is a
rare plant. I have found it ^{certainly} not more than
two & I believe in only one small bunch. The
last remittance contains a few spec. It occurs
in that final region which has furnished so
many queer things though out in the final
itself. It grew near though out on the bank
of the Pinal Creek. Lower down & on the bank
is *Mauria racemosa* from which I gathered the
other day some fruit very receptable I suppose
though not so measurable as when we did it
know what it was. A little lower down is the
point where I found *Zanthoxysis*. I say —
point for I believe the little I found was on
a square foot — perhaps all from one root.
But you don't say what Cypis has done
with Ancistrocladus how! how!! I am
unable to call to mind the appearance
of *Grevillea rotundifolia*. On my way here
from Saltillo I found a new *Pasciflora*
with a crown quite rudimentary — only here and
there a short filament.

In my letters accompanying the last remittance
of plants I mention a box contents part of the Mayan
coll sent thence by ship to Cuba where it has been
and still now. When I determined to send not to bring
my coll. I wrote to Cuba begging Baco to send the
box to the Caimanera (Quintana) the Port of Saltillo.
The first answer was that the box could not be found. I
send a description back. This brought the reply that it
was found and was to be forwarded that very day. So I
gave myself no more uneasiness about it. When
I sent to the Caimanera my 10 packages to be put
with the box it could not be found. Well up to today
expecting that the box ft. Baco was in Cuba I begged
B. also to send it by the returning "Arria" (train of packmules)

and "any thing else", if there was anything. Well to my
gratification & disappointment at the same time the
former box came & the latter didn't. So you will
lack a small part of my last two years gatherings
till I send again & I must wait till 2
go. I know ^{if} this has not come my boy clothing has come
I shall miss most the water-proof things. For other
things I can get along.

We have the journals down to the 5th inst. You I
suppose by this time know the destination of the
great armament. I hope they will soon do some
thing decisive to relieve us from this suspense ^{and} ~~as~~ the results of
nothing else. (Later paper make known the destination.)

25th I have examined the plants in the box ft. May-
an & there is no more mouth than the day I sent
them off. They are in first rate condition. Wish you
had them. 27th Got my boy of clothing at last

Filantropia Dec. 3 When about to set out from
M. V. for L. sent a regio to N. ^{sophie} ~~open~~ on my pack-
horse & hurt his back. Hurt it very badly con-
tinued & I don't know now when I will be again on the
road. It is dry now & I long to be away. Meanwhile I
spent a day on La Guineo hunting moose mainly. I
mean to go to Lorna del Gato in a day or two. Baton
size enough forgot the H. B. W. J. T. No matter now
If my horse is not soon in condition to travel I may
go by steam. To Havana. Another plan I have thought
of is to take one more turn round by Bayamo. Holguin
Mayan &c then sell my horses & bag & baggage
to Havana & from there home — when I get ready —
to return one more to this part of the island.

13th We are in the midst (I hope not) of a long mon-
ther. It has lasted a week & more. I have made 3
excursions on La Guineo & L. del Gato. Tomorrow
(T. 7th) I'll set out for Bayamo. We have the V. Y. Her-
ald to the 23d ult with all the numbers about Ma-
son & Shedd. I hope you will not come across the work
of hanging J. D. pirates. I read such retaliatory batch-
ery. I don't see what good it can now do. The privateer
is reduced to insignificance I am no advocate of

blow'd her nor strangulation but y am hanging
is to be done & you would put in among the victims
Beecher, Sumner, Garrison & such cattle. To
go some distance out of the way to see the fun
Bayamo 16. Now I might as well wind
up this journal. Got here today - mean to
go on in two or three days & hope to keep
going till I get to some good stopping
place not far fr Habana (how the flea
bit!)
