

San Jose June 17th 1862

My Dear Dr

Five consecutive rainy days is what I have not witnessed in Cuba till now. This "spell of weather" ended yesterday. One can't not venture a quarter of a mile from the house without an even chance of getting a wetting before he comes get back. Today I went on an excursion into the hills which I had intended to make on the first of the rainy days I have been here more than three weeks & have not yet had a right good excursion. A negro boy went with me & as is generally the case he was more plague than profit. He carried a box to collect water for his master & such a thing in such wood is about as portable as an umbrella spread. I thought M. Verde has thickets & entanglements but it can't keep up with these wood. I found some novelties as might be expected. *Phlebotomia* is not rare I got pretty well grown fr. I have examined again carefully the flowers & find them 5-petaled - two lateral ones small. The stam. vary in number 7-9. I hope you will have the errors corrected when an opportunity occurs. It is here a small tree - less than the one I found in Gateras. Don Jose Blain - mine host - takes much interest in botany & collects all the trees & shrubs which are of any interest for beauty, utility or curiosities. He saves specimens for his brother in law & plants in the garden or ~~at~~ arboreda young trees. He has a number that I have not met with. He keeps a catalogue of every thing with its trivial name & its botanical name if he knows it. He has by hook or crook learned

ed the names of many which I do not know &  
I in turn help him to the names of some unknown  
to him. He has accumulated what knowledge he pos-  
sesses on the old foggy system of "andras" & "gymnas"  
& he sticks to it at good deal. Gauviale-Del Rose's brother-  
in-law has a considerable herbarium of the shrubs & trees  
principally of the island but rather poor specimens I  
thought from the few I looked at. He lives in Havana  
I was there the last days of May. It's a nasty place  
Dust Dust & more dust when it don't rain & when it  
does you have puddle pools, pound of mud. They  
give neighboring accounts of the flora of the savannas  
a few leagues farther west. I am about 20 leagues  
westward of Havana right at the foot of the Range  
range of mountains. They are not very high but  
rocky & steep with abundance of for all kinds where  
I always find something good. O.S. I want some-  
thing on the monopetalae. I am vexed that you  
did not print on the receipt of the man. That must  
need be a supplement or something of the kind and  
it appears to me that it would have been better to  
print as fast as possible. It was to have been done  
by the end of last year if I remember well.

23d Retained today for a visit of two or three days  
to Retiro the other place of Don José. I collected quite  
a number of plants & his garden which tho' indig-  
nous in other parts are not found here or rarely —  
the oak included. I shall probably have occasion to put  
down Retiro as a locality many times. I sent you in  
my only last letter a scrap of a *Garcinia* with fibrous  
arillus. Dr. Rose says it is descended in La Laguna as a  
sapindaceous plant — odd enough is true  
27th I got Rs 141 for the draft you sent me - 6 p.c.  
its demand

When I was in Habana 6 days I had a troublesome diarrhea  
and it still continues to some extent - that is - if I eat a  
little too much (& who does sometimes?) I suffer from  
indigestion. I am naturally of constive habit & this change  
continuing so long & so unusual with me causes me  
some uneasiness. And somehow I don't feel so energetic  
as I used to do - fancy maybe. I have a good appetite  
& am obliged to divide it which is an unpleasant task.  
We have a nice little creek a short distance from the house  
when I can go & bathe as often as I please.  
We get the Havana paper every day but lately it contains  
little or nothing from the United States. There appears to  
have been no mail in some time or else "Todos los dolos"  
have run away with my letters. Nothing fr. home since  
20th Apr. I am impatiently waiting the coming of  
Gmelin's in order to make our excursion together  
into the "monte alto" or "down the country" that is  
to the westward — down the way the wind blows.  
The Melastomad bother me amazingly. We must  
either have several genera not in Gmelin or the gen.  
will have to be divided & new ones established or  
the gen. char. enlarged to admit such as are now  
excluded by slight differences of floral structure.  
There's a work on Jamaican Botany - Macfadyen  
I believe or some such name. Is it complete & can  
you get it for me without sending to England? If it  
does not contain the monopetalae & Endogaea it will  
be little better than Gmelin - perhaps not so good.

My "sayso" on the *Clusiaceae* you can send  
to Gmelin's. I would be glad that you do so  
if you can conveniently.
