

Toscana July 27th 1863

My Dear Dr.

Don José has made & repeated to me a statement which I received with some incredulity namely that the plants found here in the low lands of the coast are again met with on the summit of the mountains to the south. I find some confirmation of his remarks. For example In the low saline woods near the sea-side occurs in abundance *Savia erythroxylodes* which I remember to have seen elsewhere only on rocky ledges at the top of the mountains. The same may be said of a sp. of *Dypteryx*? which I have sent as *D. mucronata* if I am not mistaken. I put it with a? for though I have found it with fr. of all sizes and at all seasons I have not yet seen a fl. - One or two sp. of *Drythoxyylum* also grow in the saline woods with great luxuriance. I find two sp. of *Myrsinidu*. A ~~sapindum~~<sup>sapindum</sup> with small leaves somewhat like Myrsin but short. Yesterday I found the t. of a *Baphot*. a great bush armed with compound spines. The fl. are those of ~~Cestrum~~<sup>Phyllanthus</sup> though the whole plant looks quite unlike that genus. I got a dose of manchurial in my eyes so today they are a little bunged up. I have now had a touch in the same style of *Sapum* & *Hippomane* & have no desire to repeat the operation. They ain't good eye-medicines. On *Hippomane* I find a sp. of *Arcenthobium* - *A. mancinella* Mr. A curious looking bush is met with here - all the branches are drooping thus  It has exactly the leaves of *Annona lineata* but it is *Celastraceous*. I did not bring with me the new Gen. Pl. so can not study it out from the fresh fl. (seeds ecarunculate)

31. A word more on the subject with which I began. You have doubtless found among the plants a retaceous bush without fl. or fr. collected in few spec. for its singular leaves - a pair of obovate-roundish leaflets at the end of a broad glabrous midrib or petiole. Those Specimens were found on the very topmost point of Monte Libano. I have not met with it since, till now - and on the very edge of the mangrove swamp. Now I have plenty of fl. & I think it is a *Pagana* which I shall take the liberty of naming *P. obovata*. I find also other evidences of the reasonableness of your Blain assertions. Yesterday I got another sore in the eye from a *Saprum*. I suffered very much for half the night. This morning my eyes full very big & clumsy. The other day I found a nice little Comp. of which I shall send you a bit just to keep you in heart with promises of plenty more. It is quite distinct from any thing in Grise.

Aug 1st. A few days ago I found a large bush with 3 fl. Cal. 5-8-p. intricate in trace of cor. nor stam. Goony with 4 crest ovules. Today I found the 5th fl. exactly those of *Diphlosis* - cor. double row of appendages stam - anthers exserted - or any (apparently) perfect - every thing. Truly spring thing with little obovate-roundish conaceous leaves hard to make decent specimens of it. Do you know any thing like it? Aug 6: I judge the 3 fl. mentioned above were ovaries from which the fl. had fallen though they looked like buds & the plant must be *Diphlosis horrida*. I have got my paper & now can work on a larger scale. Yesterday I sawd sp. of a palm near to my coll. & found some other novelties.

Sauvalle will sail for Europe about the 20th inst visiting N. York & perhaps some other cities of the

Aug 12th. Just got yours of 7th ult. Why did you direct it to Sauvalle in Habana? Well if I must I must do battle for Rivera & it is now that an hundred. A better man than Gundlach is not to be met with & he understand Spanish. When there for it came to his knowledge that Rivera did give in Habana gold for a nominally quivalent amount deposited in A.G., he solicited for me the same favor. I don't know the motives of Dr. but I can suppose that being (as he is) very rich & liberal-minded (a characteristic more observable here than in Yankie-dom) he chose to exercise his generosity in this way. He may have been induced to give a poor scientific rambler a lift indirectly under cover of protest of a business transaction. My directions were plain & if by following them I had suffered loss this looks would have been mine & not yours. Suppose you had put in the Brandt House \$100.00 in green backs. I would at any rate have got for them in Habana \$60.00 - \$70.00 more or less. I would have preferred to lose a few dollars to remaining six months without money. Allow me to say that in this matter you have shown an excess of distrust in my judgment in that of Gundlach and a superfluity of caution generally which so far as I am concerned I feel sensibly "I do not know - that the zoological package were directed to me" - They were not unless they were so on the bill of lading. There was They were distinctly marked Smithsonian Institution

a pointed stick from the Smith. I did append  
to each unless it was detached during the  
passage to y<sup>r</sup> Westermann. Didn't see it & is not  
my fault. No I am wrong in this but they were plainly  
addressed to Smith. ~~20th Washington by me~~  
I didn't expect you would work yourself  
into a fever or into a passion to gratify  
Reckless James Gay. He asked me if I could  
give him a copy of Pl. Mr. Cuban. I was thinking  
to gratify him & to perfect as much as in me  
lies the flora of Cuba put the same question  
to you. I supposed it would not be very dif-  
ficult to send such a package to Matanzas  
Upon have therefore sent enough. Savalle &  
Dr. Morales being the only scientific cultivators  
of our science known to me. The latter studies  
pretty thoroughly & makes copious notes though  
I am not aware that he publishes anything. He  
had a good deal of attention to the subject in  
the Manillas whence he was banished for his  
liberalism. He is moreover an abolitionist of  
the first water — no mean recommendation  
in your eyes I suppose — nor in ours neither  
His specimens are like Parry's & unlike them  
— they are scrappy & not nice.

Your letter came here a week ago but was mislaid  
Along with it came one from Eaton with a certificate  
for \$100.00 deposited with Duncan, Sherman & Co. So  
now by sending it endorsed to Habana I shall  
have money.

When Gundlach comes I shall learn from him  
how I can write to Germany & I will then be able  
to communicate direct with Lipschack

I have been here nearly four weeks & as I wrote to Danville I have been successful beyond my most sanguine expectations

The printed tickets of which I wrote above were received by me fr. Baird after the arrival of the Zoological Coll but they were well treated by me "Smithsonian Institution Washington City" & if I remember well you did on some occasion give me the credit of writing a good & plain direction. At any rate I did my best & thought it unnecessary to write to Westermann as he had before done the same business for us not imagining that he would <sup>send</sup> you packages marked as above described.

I have written you a tolerably long letter this time so wont bother you with anything more than to subscribe myself as ever
