

Los Remedios Dec 20th 1863

My dear Dr

If you shoule think I had forgotten you
it would not be strange. I haven't answered yours
of Sept 18th - the last I have from you - received Oct 4.
But you won't miss a little lacuna in my correspon-
dence. When your letter came I had no matter for a
reply & ever since I have been so situated that it was
in convenient to write besides that I had nothing of
importance to write about.

As the subjects of that letter are rather old - got cold -
I'll not allude to them but tell you briefly what I've
been doing the last two or three months. The latter part
of Oct. I crossed the mountains to the north coast Yoscam
Stayed there till Nov 15 - collecting still more. mostly
Went to Saguas (vegas) - climbed Guajibon twice always
finding something that appeared new made an excur-
sion to Cajalbana (pin ridge crossing the island) got
a bran new almost arborescent Euphorbia followed
down the north side near the coast through La Palma,
romba & Rio, Bajas, Mantua, every where collecting
now & then something nice & new. Stopped some days
in that hilly pin region when I was last year
nearly at the same date. The lagunas as well as the
pin flats gave me a goodly number of new things
as well as additional & sometimes better specimens
than I found last year. I regret exceedingly that I can
not give this district a thorough summer examination
From Asiento Viejo (the lagunas) I followed the same route
to the Jaula the terminus of my travels last year. I
wanted to go to the cape but finding no guide I was
content to go to a point on the south coast four leagues
"afiez" - terribly rocky path - near cape Corrientes. At the
Jaula picked up some poor specimens of a Sciadophyllum

the leaves, which are full of pell-mell lines & dots exactly
after the style of Caudaria. And I may remark that a
part of the specimens of this excursion will be severely
poor & scrappy - winter plants - pass. - the best I could
well do. There will generally be enough to describe by
& for you beside. I meet too so many things that
I can not determine by what books I have (Griseb.) Rubi-
aceae Myrsinaceae Melastomaceae &c for example & then
on these long excursions I hesitate long before collecting
a bulky plant which has a familiar look & common-
ly or often settle my conscience with one or two or a
few Specimens. For example - here are four or five Psychotria
Gen. Mapouria, not one of which I can determine to my own
satisfaction, and I meet with not one which I can de-
termine. There are some common Labiatae (wads) Salvia Apo-
linis &c that I can't make out. And the same may be said
of many other families or genera. This place is just at the
western end of the pine region and where the peninsula
swamps & woods begin. Nearly all this peninsula is only
passable on foot being one continuous scrubland - negro
where the rough limestone (coralline) comes to the surface
in rugged sharp projections (diente de perro - dog's tooth)
We've had a thunder for several days & I am now almost
shivering with cold - perhaps you are quite. Tomorrow
probably I shall set out for Arecibo Viejo where I
left some dry plants & which I want to give another
little examination. I go then to "La Laguna" near the
southern coast - pine woods all the way - Then I
propose to return to Guane & from there through the
hill country ^{apart} which I traverse last year or the begin-
ning of this. It is the only country which is likely to yield
me brach. I am anxious to get back to Retiro to know
what is going on at home. It is somewhat more than a
month since I have seen a paper containing any news
& met a gentleman who told me that Grant had gained

a victory over Bragg. Arrived at Retiro I think of
dryng up every thing as soon as possible take them
to Habana, & dispatch them to N. York & then continue on
to Cuba. In the spring or summer I mean to come home
war or no war. You had better not write me any more
unless you do so immediately on the receipt of this & have
something of interest to communicate. I am well
