

Balestena Feb 13th 1866.

Dear Dr

A few days ago came yours of the 16th ult. Now it seems we understand one another about past operations & know that nothing has been lost but one or two letters which though vexatious at the time we can learn to forget.

I have been working at the ferns getting also caudices Mr Sauvage goes to Habana to stay in a few days. He offered to take my collection with him. I may accept his offer if it should appear that it will not be too troublesome to him. If I can get together caudices of another tree fern I think I shall send all these and get him to look out a chance of sending them to New Haven if possible which however I think doubtful. I write to Mr Eaton asking him for direction how to send so many or another it will not be long I hope before you receive caudices of the three or four large ferns found at this end of the island. I aim to send two of each these can be split (with a saw) and they will make two specimens each more valuable (in my judgment) than the whole if kept entire.

I have been bothered with *Alchornea latifolia*? Grisebach describes the leaves as cylindar at the base. I find them provided with glands and with hair tufts in the vein axils. Is he right? Please look at your Cuban specimens.

The *Sillanderia* bother me awfully. Do please look at some of the figures and see if the filaments are really twisted as Ljris. says. Bot. Mag. t. 3288, 3275. Bot. Reg. t. 749.

What is the difference between 3-nerved & tripli-nerved as *Tschudiya rufescens* & *T. flagracensis*? No &c

Mrs. uses the word subulate in some sense peculiar to him
I can't understand it - e.g. *Schultzia heterophylla* - "filaments
— subulate at the base" I fancy that subulate always
refers to the tip of an organ - not to the base. *Polyodium*,
pectinatum - "segments - from a subequal, subulate, adnate base"
What can that mean?

A clause in your letter I don't comprehend. "If we have, as
I fear, ourselves to make out the list of your whole
collection according to the numbers, I only wish you
may be here to take it in hand" The distribution-numbers
(most of them) are given by me (you) after the name or
descriptions.

At last I have a letter from Mr. Curtis. He says he himself hasn't
heard from Mr. Berkeley in five or six years & don't even know if
he is alive. Says the last Cuban collection promise will tho'
somewhat injured by insects.

I have made out a list of the numbers of my distributee's
plants and have under shoulder name one he can't wait at
all the species he has. I have asked of Mr. Gray, Penning & Trelle
lists of this numbers. With these for a guide we need not
in future give them any duplicates. I would like a similar
list for Gray & any or all others who do not want to
receive duplicates. and the supernumerary specimens will
serve for new sets or for exchange. Can you do anything
towards realizing this object?

Coming down the river the other day a large branch of yugum
fell on my head - almost. It gave me some nice specimens —
came down a-purpos!

I forgot whether I asked you to change the direction of
your letter thus "J. M. Morals &c Havana" By this will
save some delay, some risk of loss & some postage. The letter
need not go to Matthews & then back again to Havana - They

will come on to me at once.
