My dear Dr. Robinson -

I am returning with  
this the proof of the Auburnia  
article. I added an Alstead  
note under A. Favellii. If this  
will make any extra expense it  
had better be omitted as it is of  
little consequence.

I wonder if you noticed the  
inferior plate-paper which Houghton  
furnished us in the July Rhodora.  
Mr. Webster is as much displeased  
as I am as I know you will be  
and it seems to us that some

reduction ought to be expected in the bill for this month.

I have at the house where we are living (I am writing in the lecture room) a note from Miss Coburn on the Maine station for Lactuca maritima. I will send it as soon as I can rewrite it a little.

We are having some very successful batanning and there are several plants herbariums which will apparently furnish some good notes. Monday on one of our long driving excursions down the Ashuelot through Saco we found a very interesting colony of Sphagnum things - Panicum barbulatum, Carex laeviflora var. californica? Desmodium

Oryzopsis lanceolata, Ampelium theaeum,  
Habenaria oryzoides &c. growing under some striking  
geographical conditions. Mr. Field offers to write  
a joint paper with me, after further observations,  
to work out the physiographical and geographical  
part. This, I think, will make a readable and  
fairly good paper for Bethia.

Our school has begun very satisfactorily (for  
the first year). As I write, Webster is lecturing  
at the other end of the room to our seven  
students. Very soon we shall increase our  
numbers to ten, as three ladies are coming  
for the last half of the session.
