Jan 4, Monday Finca Monte Cristo
6:30 — 5:30 to the Quebrada Guayabo

Today we followed the Rio Cedro ^{directly} south
nearly to its source, then crossed a ridge
lying E-W which rises up to 1800 m. at least
then went down & set up camp in the
Quebrada Guayabo which runs Eastward.
On the ridge there is guinea, but we had
to pass due to the late hr. and plan to re-
turn morning. In the low lands around the
upper reaches of the Rio Cedro and on the
other side of the ridge near the Quebrada
Guayabo there are a ~~large~~ ^{small} number of
Cancha blanco but they are usually
small, scarcely passing 6" in diam.
sometimes 8 or 10. Filled of tacky milk.
They say that farther down south they are
larger. This collected. Seems to be a
Moraceae? but probably not a Ficus. A 8 apri.

At the headwaters of Rio Cedro is the
last Finca of Don Alfonso Trujillo. The
lands to be investigated start at the head-
waters north of the ridge.

Jan 5 Tuesday Quebrada Guayabo - Villaboa

Quebrada Guayabo. We left at about ^{6:30} 5:30 AM to climb up back to the Filo to see guinine. Arturodraga, Angel Motta & I made a trip round first going eastward, mounting a second cordillera to about 1500-1800 m. There are innumerable treelets of "guina tuna", all small, usually about 2" in diam, never more than 5 1/2 or 6. There are approximately ^{at the most, on average 1500.} 2000-~~1000~~ of these per hectare. We made several counts of plots 25 metres square, resulting in 1/16 of a hectare. There are from 140-170 treelets per square 25 metres.

Samples were taken from the root and from the trunk about 3 ft. up. Photos were taken also.

(Senor Motta says that there is also "guina marañá" and "guina cuprea". Knudsen is buying only "tuna" at 10¢ a kilo.)

"Caucho blanco," acc. to present, was formerly worked here. There are very few trees here in this filo, perhaps some 5- or 6 per sq. hectare. All are small, except an occasional one up to 1 ft. in diam. One was seen with the marks of former cuttings or tappings.

Late in the afternoon, we returned to the

Camp on R. Guayabo and set out for the
camp already made at the confluence
of R. Guayabo + R. Vallabos. Spent the
night. Villareal left here.

Jan. 6. Wednesday Villalobos - Quebrada Hedionda.
We left the camp 7:30 - 4:30

Early & walked all day through a flat
plains in which there were remains or
vestiges of former habitations. No
guineine & an occasional tree of "caucho
blanco".

The peasants said that at the headwaters
of the Inezja which we crossed ($\frac{1}{2}$ hr. up from
where the path goes) there are stands of "caucho
rosado". These we shall try to see on return.

We visited one of the many pozos of
saline H₂O in this region. Holes in soft rock
with a bluish gray water coming out tastes
of salt. In Quebrada Hedionda, Photo.

Overtaken by storm terrific thunder
storm. Built ranch on L. Hedionda &
camped at 4:30.

Rained all night.

About one hundred + fifty people formerly worked rubber + guanine in the district 65 yrs. ago. All the rubber + guanine from the region north of Mocoa came out through Pitalito because the house of purchase was in a centre south of Pitalito called Guachicas, on the Rio Guachicas. Sev. houses, a market, rum-mill, etc. Now only 1 house, very old. Formerly roads very good. Mules + horses entered. Remnants of telegraph line commenced 10 yrs. ago, never finished to Mocoa from Pitalito. Now a rd. in plans from Pitalito - Mocoa.

Jan 7. Thursday 2. Hedionda - 2. Quebradona
7:30 - 3:00

Left camp & took the path over the
Filo de la mina de petroleo, about 1 hr.
to the mines which are ^{sepages} in a N-S
valley or fault. There are about 12
pozos or sepages, out of which runs thick
greenish petroleum. ^{Rock is gray shale.} Returned with samples.
Resumed path in general southwest
direction. Arrived at the prearranged
camp on 2. Quebradona. early in afternoon.
Found a large tree with reddish bark,
80 ft. tall. Photos. Not "Cancho Colorado"
acc. to Fr. Ortiz & has never been worked.
Cut tree. Latex in the cambium but not
abundant. Make rings every 1 1/2 ft but the
latex does not coagulate & heavy rains
interfered.

Heavy rains from 5 on.

Quantities -

Señor Ortiz says that formerly most trees of Cancho blanco as well as colorado were felled + ringed every $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft or so. That one good sized tree of Cancho colorado thus yielded 5 - 6 lbs of dry rubber. The rubber was allowed to coagulate on cuts + in 3 or 4 days strips were pulled off + rolled into balls. If raining latex washed off + would not coagulate, so a dry season procedure, more or less.

Quebrada Quebradona —
Jan. 8 Friday Cabezas de la Quebrada
to Camp Tower Rio Canchos at 4:30
Camp 7:00 - 1

We followed the Quebrada far up
to near its source, as the guides said
there was Cancha blanco in quantity
there. Very bad trail, not cut at all,
& bad because of rain. 2 trees seen.
Ficus, Clusia, etc. in quantity, but
quite a few of the red gum tree felled
yesterday, but no stands of Cancha
blanco. One tree studied. 2'8" in cir-
cumf. about 70' tall. Bore scars of for-
mer tapping, showing tree at least
30 yrs old for these were made that long
ago. Well healed. See photo. Made
some Varnishes. Latex in canbrium, very
thick, doesn't run freely, ~~Bark~~ Bark
rel. thick, canbrium lying 1/2 inch deep.
Returned to camp on Quebrada at about
one.

Cauchos blancos abounds where the
white *Cecropia* grows ^(no) I should say
between 1500 - 1700 m. The quebrada
(about 1400 m) has no white *Cecropia* but another sp.

From the filo de petroleo one can see
the large numbers of white *Cecropia*
& natives say abounds in rubber.

I sent in the morning Sr. Ortiz, an
old cauchero to the headwaters of the
Rio Cauchos with Tolano + a peasant, with
orders to make estimates as to the number
of trees per hectare. This, he says, is
caucho blanco + an area which he formerly
worked. They are to join me tomorrow at
the camp on the Villalobos.

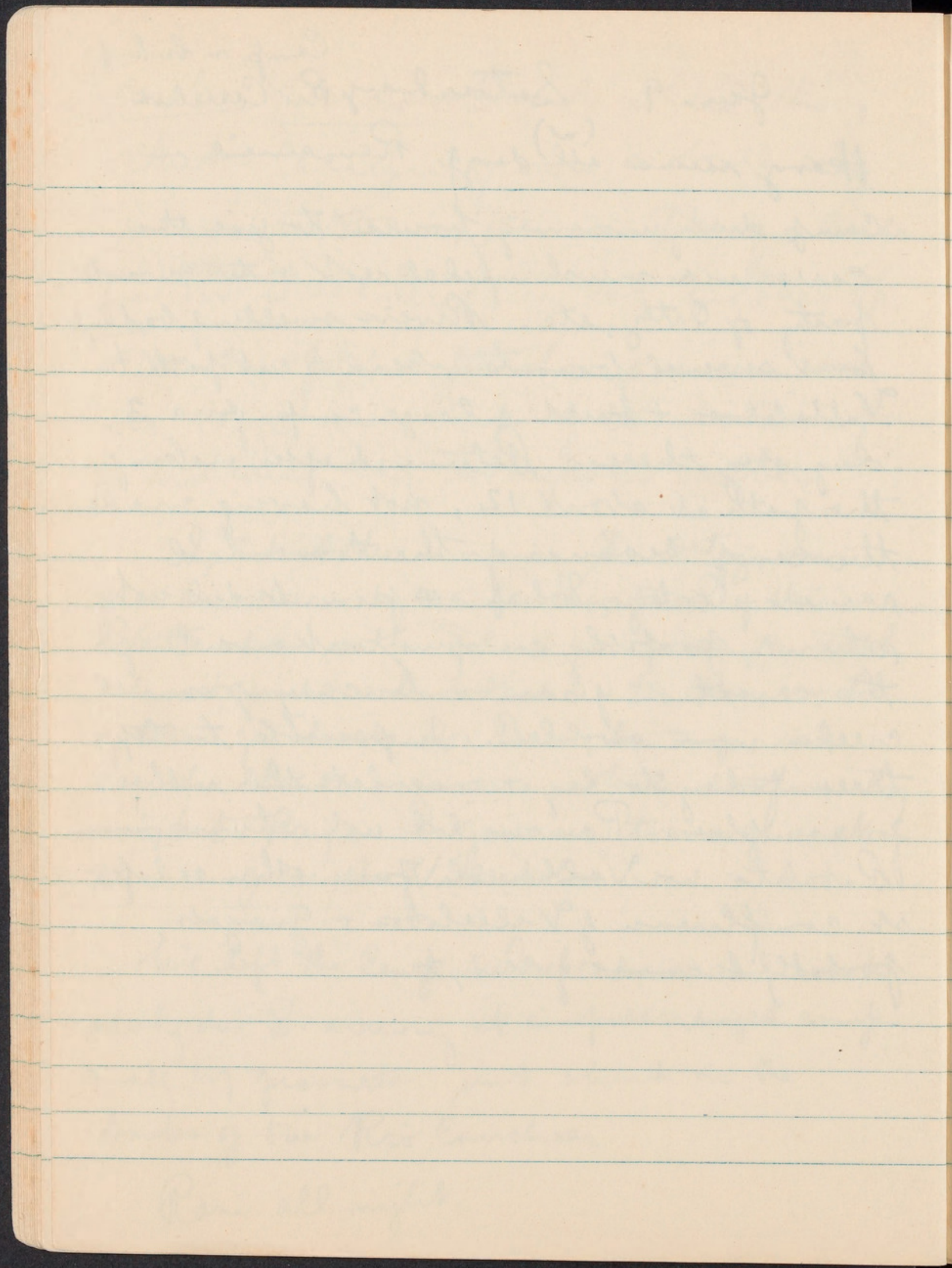
We left the Camp at Quebradona and went
nearly due S. arriving at a prearranged camp
made by peasants just ahead on the
banks of the Rio Cauchos.

Rain all night.

Jan. 9 Saturday Rio Cauchos.

Heavy rains all day. Remained in camp during morning hours to give the carriers a much needed rest & to await party of Ortiz, etc. River is swelling badly. Sent several peasants ahead to cut path to Villalobos & build a large camp for a 3 day stay there. Returned after making the path at about 12, not having made the camp because of the torrential rains. Ortiz, Solano & peasant did not return, probably camping out awaiting the cessation of rain & lowering of small creeks now swollen. Impossible to tap trees today to dry & coagulate the rubber for samples. Ramon did not return from Pitalito nor Villareal from other camp at confluence of Villalobos & Guayabo, probably because of rain, too.



Jan 10 . Sunday Camp on Río Cauchos to
Río Villabos below
confluence & back (9-3)

While awaiting return of Sr. Ortiz + Solano from the upper reaches of the Río Cauchos, I visited and inspected carefully the land around this camp and south and east to the Villabos just below the confluence of the Cauchos. No rubber anywhere. Too low for guinnie.

In the late afternoon the commission of Ortiz returned. They had made a trip to the upper waters of the Río Cauchos up as far as there were beaches (where the cliffs commenced). Likewise, no cauchos. Ortiz says that 30 yrs. ago there was cauchos & that he worked it. Says that today it is probably confined to the quebradas far upstream which constitute the headwaters of the Río Cauchos. Says on the ridges passed, they saw a large number of "guinnie trees" (Samples). Some are nearly $1\frac{1}{2}$ ' in diam. he says & in places there are 5 or 6 of these per hectare and hundreds of smaller saplings in

between.

Says Ortiz there is caucho colored
down south along the Villalobos
& on other (east) side of Villalobos
because the caucheros of 30 yrs ago
had no paths there, did not cross the
Villalobos. Says here they cut down
all trees, ringed them, & even pulled
& cut out the roots to increase yield.

Camp on Rio Canchros
Jan 11. Monday Eastern side of Villabos.
8 — 2

Beautiful day until about 1. Afternoon
very heavy rain, rivers swelling again.
This morning the lands on the eastern
bank of the Villabos just below the
confluence were studied. No rubber.
I have sent Sr. Ortiz & a peasant south to
open a path to the cañal of cañcho
colorado which he says is near a spot
known as Cajones. I shall follow on
tomorrow. We shall cut & tap rubber &
let it dry 3 or 4 days. During this time,
I shall return to the north to visit
stands of cañcho blanco which are
reported on upper reaches of Suga and
L. Hebrides & to which I am sending
peasants to open up paths & make camps.
In the meantime (while rubber is drying)
I shall have Ortiz out with rest of the
way to Yunguillo & then come out
bringing rubber samples.

Henry Rami in afternoon + stayed in
camp. Ramon Rodriguez + Villa-
real arrived at 5.

Jan. 12 Tuesday
Camp Rio Cancho
along Villalobos path
to where Ortiz is
working + back to
camp. 8:30 - 10

Camp Rio Cancho
to the Quebrada north
of camp on quebrada
Hedionda 10:30 - 4:30
going north.

Went South to see cancho Colorado,
hoping that Don Juan + Vicente had made
the path to the spot where the sand is
exposed. They had advanced only one
league + made camp due to rain. I
would have to wait around doing
nothing for several days to see cancho
Colorado. Decided to send Ramon
Rodriguez to help with path to the
Cancho + continue it to the town of
Yunguillo to reprovision. I shall
go to Pitalito to see Fosberg, visit
Florence, + when path is finished
go all the way to Yunguillo thus
seeing cancho Colorado.

Set out of camp north + made
camp at 11:30.

Heavy rain in afternoon.

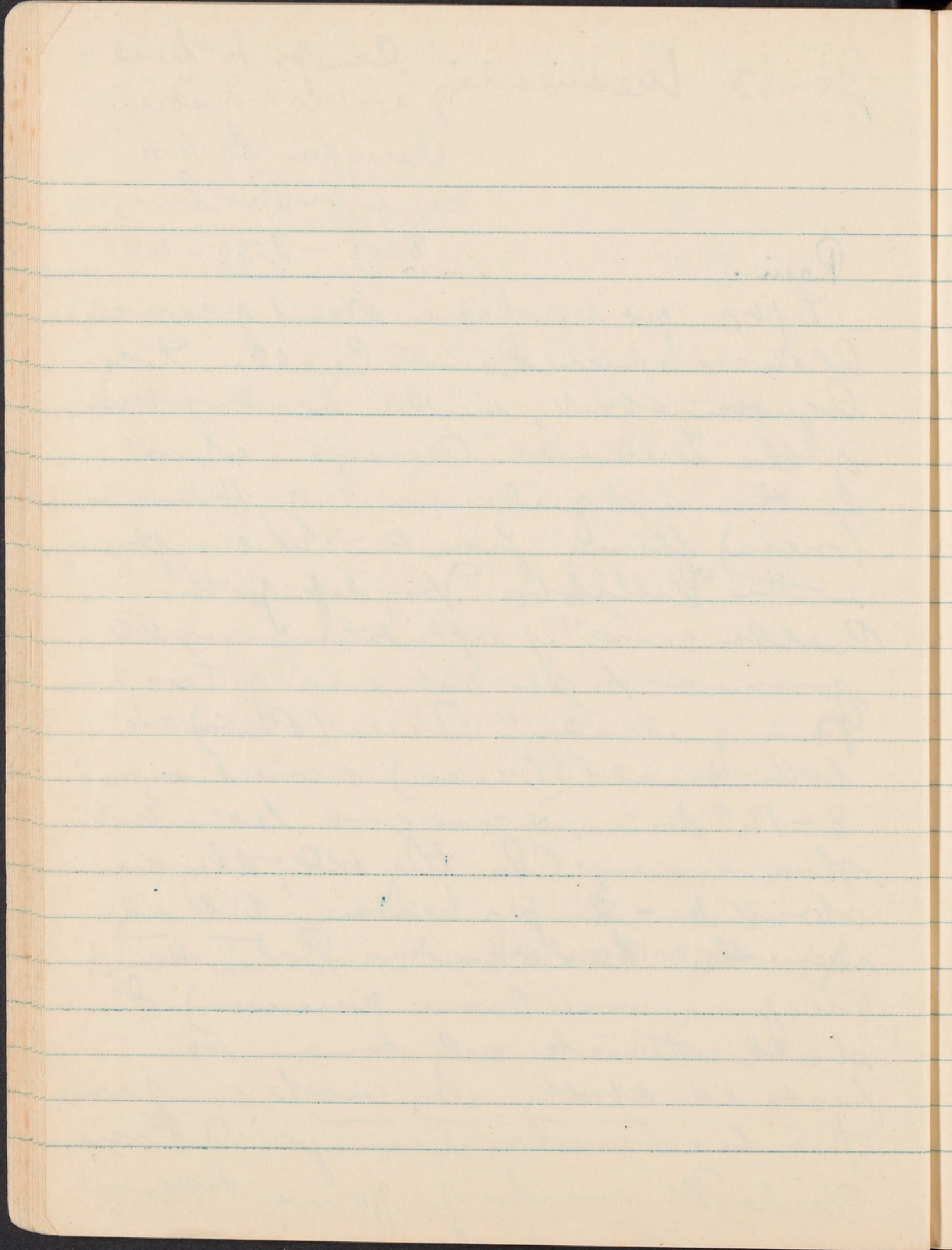

Jan 13 Wednesday Camp. to head-
waters of Quebrada

Left camp & searched a stand of canchales
blanco which Ramón Cuellar Trece
Agustin about, in the headwaters
of the Quebrada Arroyán which
is the next quebrada S of Hedionda
(near) flowing from E → W & emptying
into the Vallis de los Yungas. Very diff. path.
"Quella sabe" if exploitation comes, he
promises to get out a no. of tons for
this quebrada. Trees (Photo) are
both small (baras) & med sizes
8-12" diam., & give good latex but
slow running. Counting all they are
about 6 - 8 per hectare but only
near the headwaters. Below there
are few or none (none were seen). I
should estimate only some 100
hectares at the very most comprise
this headwater drainage. A Ficus
Sterile. No marks of former tapping.



Jan. 14 Thursday

7:15 - 5:30

Early I left camp with several peons to go to the headwaters of the Río Suaza where Sr. Motta says there is considerable cañcho blanco. About $1\frac{1}{2}$ hrs up we encountered the first trees. There is also a very similar tree of the same genus which gives leche but which does not coagulate. I should say that there are perhaps ⁸⁻¹⁰ ~~10-12~~ trees per hectare here. All the peons say there are many more up above. One good sized tree ($1\frac{1}{2}$ ft diam.) was felled and slashed for its entire length, covered carefully with leaves of Carludovica + left to coagulate for samples. I shall return & send a peasant in a wk. to collect it. Returned to camp on Suaza & set out for camp on Villalobos + Guayabo. Spent night. Rained all night.

I hope some way without too much expense of time & money, to enter Fregua area where Luis Vasquez says there is cancho negro & balatas. Still awaiting petacas left in mountains by overloaded peasants.

In the evening Romulo Cuellar came in & I talked all evening with him. Too old & ill to accompany me, but gave me all the data possible. He says that in no place is "caucho colorado" present in large quantities. Also says that the "caucho blanco" is localized in the headwaters of only a few quebradas and that in its most rich spots the number of trees would never pass 8 per hectare. He says that there are a number of trees up to $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. in diam, but that most are 1 ft. or smaller. His custom in the old days of caucho exploitation was to fell the tree, for "tapping yields nothing to speak of". Felled, the tree was carefully cut, horizontal strips 1" wide of bark were removed to let the latex flow. Care had to be taken not to injure the wood. One tree of 1 m. in diam he felled gave $1\frac{1}{2}$ arroba (38 lbs.)

but this exceptional he says. Usually an ~~one~~ ordinary tree would give 5-8 lbs. The cuts were made "1 hand" apart + later after coll. rubber which coagulated after 8 days, new cuts were made in between. The stump & roots are especially rich & are scarred. ^(used as "azuela gurbia" 3 de los) After ~~washing~~ washing, Rubber pulled off in strips. After washing + kneading, prepared in balls, it is white & very elastic. The practice was to fell + cut the tree in the afternoon, says more rubber came out.

The only places where Romulo knew existence of "caucho blanco" were headwaters of Quebradas Sneyta, Arayanes, Cajon. Other places there is little or none. The headwaters of many quebradas do not have much cauchos, perhaps 1 palo per hectare. The Villalobos Rio is very poor in "caucho blanco", one finds ~~very~~ almost none along the stream, & the few it has are only in its upper reaches. "Caucho colorado" found, only in region known as "Ceibas" near confluence of Villalobos + Verdegro, acc. to Romulo. They are trees 1 1/2 ft. in diam. [Is this pink balata?] Quinine there is plenty in Palestina - Quebradona region, trees 1 1/2 ft. in diam. Region of Tragua very difficult to enter from Villalobos. Easier go in from Florencia + Cagueta. No hope for great exploitation of "caucho blanco", much cut away, very distant, & have to fell trees.

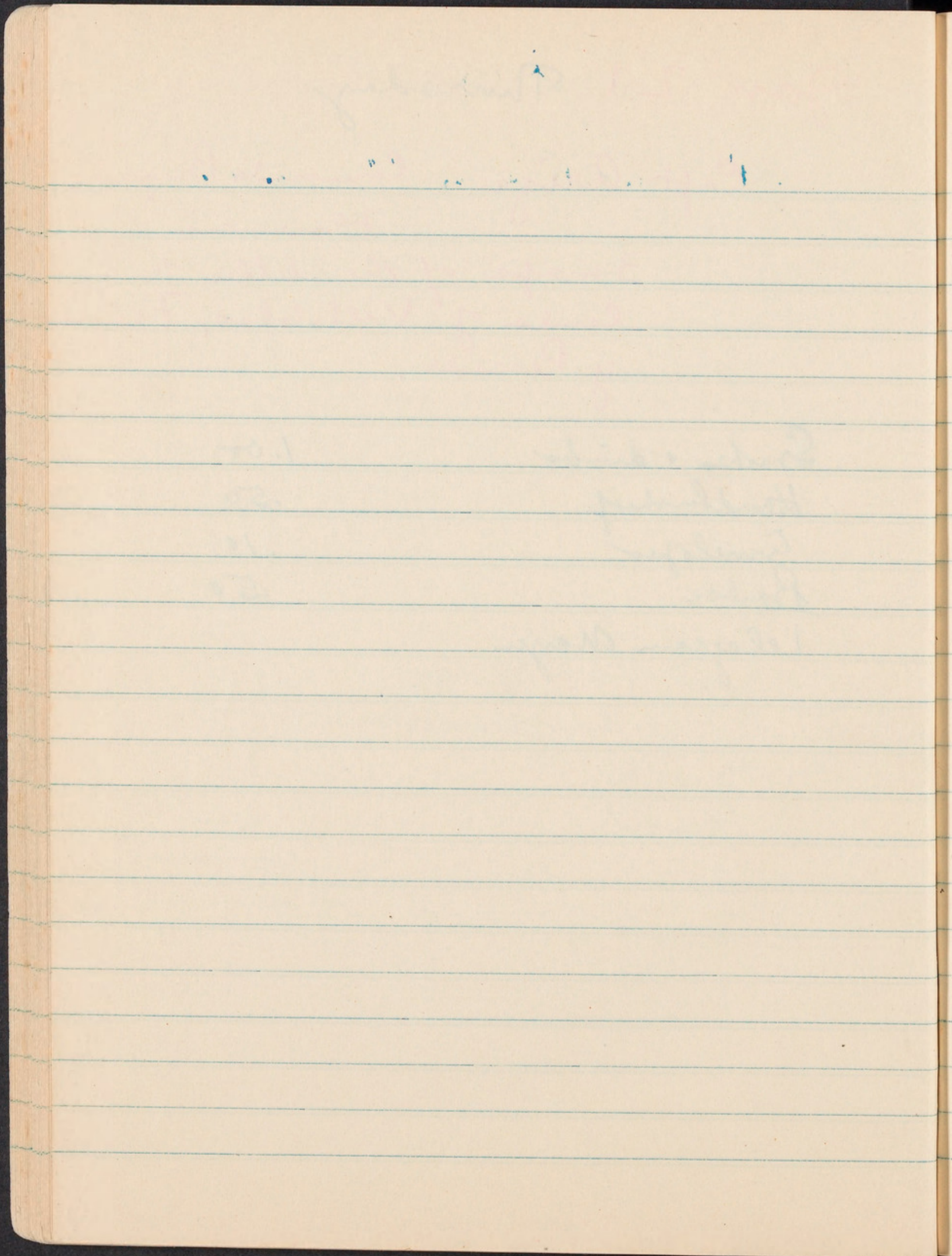

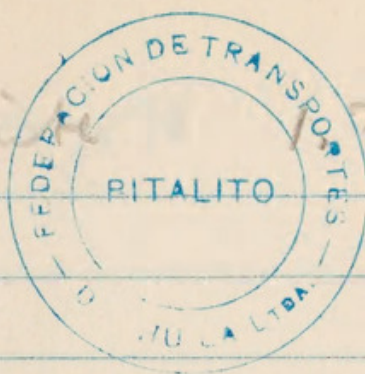

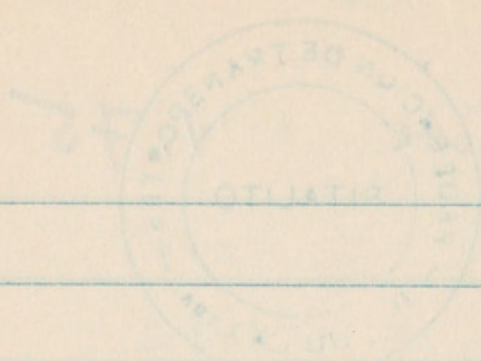
