The only stations that we have in the Columbia erbarium for Tayloria tenuis, are he enclosed from R.DS. Williams, and acouns No. I4I from Fox River, caspe Co. Quebec. We also have an imperfect specimen from maghorne. I will send your query about Entodon to Dr. Grout, or if you are writing to him, perhaps you will ask him. He is at the High Schoool at Plymouth N.H and will perhaps he able to supply you with a specimen of E. repens.

I hope you will have some notes for the Fern Bulletin, and contribute to the new moss department, which will contain short notes on new or rare finds' I am getting together a set on Anacamptodon spla chnoides, Hookeria Sullivanti, and iscelium nudum, and I think I shall be able to illustrate most of them, so that others can find and know them when they do.

The name of the Sword Moss, is Bryoziphium, though I am not sure quite that Mitten is right in keeping Eustichia for the South American species. It has occurred to me since the article was published that Mi ten might be mistaken, though he is one of the original disciples of the shhool of priority. I gave the history of the names, but that part of my m.s. was too technical for the Plant World, and so it was omitted.
