25 Aug 1903
Dear Walter,

We are still here but alas! we see the end of our stay — the ladies will go to London but what is there in London to compare with these hills & lakes: we came to this hotel Aug 1st, & I did hope to stay till Sept 1st but we start for London on Thursday next, & so farewell to "Merry England" as we have seen it here: we last week had two interesting days, the "Sports" an annual Aug. affair on the Green here at Grasmere.

and the Cumberland or West Country Sheep Dog trials on the high moors above Trout Beck; 10 or twelve miles away. We "Took in" both days and Mrs. K. was the brightest & "sportiest" of the whole party & would stay to the end.

On each day I had a fresh roll of 12 films & snapped everyone of them. The Grasmere sports included wrestling, jumping, hound trail race of eight miles and a

He looked to be bicycling down, he came so fast & his white suit made him conspicuous in the green ferns & grey rocks. Then the Sheep Dog day was another unique spectacle on the beautiful high moorlands to see the dog drive 3 sheep over a prescribed course thro' in regular order four sets of flagge posts to a certain little sheepfold on the hillside interested a large & thoroughly English
