My dear Deane:

He will remain in the city. A letter would reach him at the National Museum. You will have to think some other fund for the Star.

be in Cambridge in a week  
or so. I hope you may see  
him.

I suppose your flint will  
come in time but things look promising.  
They were mistimed during a much  
needed cleaning and I have looked  
in vain for them. I am very  
sorry but still think they will  
be found.
