THE WOLVES OF NORTH AMERICA. *Part I*, Their history, life habits, economic status, and control, *by Stanley P. Young*; *Part II*, Classification of wolves, *by Edward A. Goldman*, 8vo., XX+636, pls. 1 - 131; 15 text figs. *The American Wildlife Institute, Washington, D. C., 1944.*

Mr. Young was for many years a hunter

for the United States Government. Much of the first part of the present volume is devoted to showing what destructive creatures wolves are, and to methods of destroying them.

In *Part II* Major Goldman gives a comprehensive review of the races of the two species of wolves in North America, with plates of the skulls of many of them. There is a bibliography of 81 pages. — A. L. RAND.

Based on two and a half years' study, this paper presents a first-class, readable, and
