WEED THERAPY! PART 1

How does one get a handle on the never-ending invasion of weeds? The winter annuals are on their way out. Summer annuals are on their way in and perennial weeds such as purple and yellow nut sedge and Nothoscordum (a member of the onion family) are firmly entrenched in The Arboretum soils. The above pests not only seed their way around The Arboretum, they also produce tiny bulbs that break off from the parent plant when pulled from the soils one plant suddenly becomes twenty and so on!

The idea of a best practice, least toxic approach to pest control, including weed abatement, should not have to include the use of chemicals. Yet, as a last resort, if needed, one may have no choice. Synthetic chemicals are still used at The Arboretum. However, be assured, our in-house Pest

Control Advisor is meticulously balancing our environmental concerns, our need to control noxious weeds, and our need to choose the most appropriate weed abatement methods.

The successful control of weeds incorporates both art and science. The science is knowing the chemicals to use,

their mode of action, and the life cycle of the particular weeds you are trying to control. Unfortunately, the art

of controlling weeds is often the cause of ineffective weed control.

Learning the best techniques for removing weeds by hand is not taught at the University, it's learned on the job, and sometimes artful

weeding takes years to perfect.

Our future weed control program (**control** being the key word, for we will always have some weeds on our 127 acres) at The Arboretum will continue to be based on good science and artful gardening.

Effective weed control programs require knowledgeable and dedicated

gardeners. Also, numbers count. The more people we have assisting in our weed control efforts, the better our success. Interested volunteers will not be turned away. We will gladly teach eager volunteers the joys of weeding. Think of weeding as a therapy for the mind, body and soul. Come join our weed therapy program! Tim Phillips, Superintendent
