the several parts.



My dear Dr. Gray,

Pray accept my best
thanks for all the kind trouble
which you have taken on our
account. Both your seedings have
come safe to hand and I am
delighted with them. The Cuban
Ferns, Mosses & Lichens will sup-
ply many of our wants, and their
determination by Eaton, Sullivan
and Tuckerman adds greatly to
their value. The Rocky Mountain
Collection is a beautiful set, and
forms a capital supplement to the
Muhlmann Collection which we
already possessed from the same



quarter. I do not know whether you are aware that we purchased Stottall's own Herbarium at the sale which took place after his death and thereby added greatly to the riches of our North American Collection. We purchased also the set of Douglas' plants which belonged to the Horticultural Society.

The £6.12.0 made payable to Doct Mr Reeve will be paid to him in the course of a week or two, but you have given me no direction as to the £10.0.0 for the Rocky Mountain Collection and the Cuban Lichens, sent through Sargent now. Will you kindly direct to whom this should be made payable, in order that I may put it in the proper train forthwith?

Are there any sets still in

hand of Sullivan & Desmarest's "Musci Boreali-Americanae"? I should like much to get as perfect a set as possible.

Your conjecture as to the "dikcio-dimorphous" character of the species of Drimyspermum appears very probable, although our specimens are not sufficient to establish it. We have three species, in one of which the anthers are deitate and the style protruded, as in your D. lanceolatum; in a second the anthers are protruded and the style abbreviated; and in the third both anthers and style are protruded. In no case (probably from want of a sufficient number of specimens) do we find the two forms occurring in the same
