Dear Sir,

I have been very much gratified by your friendly letter dated Nov. 4th, and I had earlier sent you my answer, if there had been any opportunity of forwarding even a very small parcel; now I shall deliver the collection of seeds, you will receive together with these lines, to the American Minister, and I hope I shall find during the summer again some safe opportunity to communicate with you, perhaps by Mr. Bodine who is expected here on leave, of I understand well. I chose from your list of Deciduous trees what was still available and added many of the new seeds as I thought acceptable to you; You may choose from the Index soon, which you will receive only in the course of this summer, what you find there for you. I shall be happy to send you whatever is still remaining at the time. I shall get a second list of deciduous.

All merriam plants are of great use to us and by far the greater part even of those which one finds in the British gardens, are still deciduous for this garden. Whatever you have to spare, will
