Thanks I think
there is no doubt about the
narrow-leaved Aster being
Nemorolis because on stiff
larger plants some $1\frac{1}{2}$ ft. - just
now blooming - I noticed it curled
down somewhat or hugged
the stem, and as you say of the
color of the other, it does. Very
gray does not always give you
a good idea in the botany. I
shall finish them marked
as you suggest. I have now 110 new
plants Hippies? not in bloom.
If Mr. P. were like you I should
have 116 if I had been successful
in painting from the freshly dried
specimens. And I think I could
have made 132 sketches this
year - 100 grasses (I think.) I thank
you most sincerely for all you
have done for me. If you would
like to see your ferns proper if
you will lend it to me, I will
return it to you - am in a diff-
ficult place of the time now as
you will see - Return in two
weeks to B-A on somewhat better
but still work too hard -
Do you care like B-A on my Poha
mosses?
