My Dear Sir. Your esteemed favor
of the 29th June inst. is recd. The Pecoria stipu-
lata which it contains came without injury.
It is quite distinct from P. eglantulosa. If it
is to be found in this section of the Country, it
has escaped my notice.

I inclose the only specimens I have on
hand, of Larixus. It is the F. americana of
your very excellent compendium, Bot. N. State,
373. and the F. acuminata of Eaton & Wright's man
247. I believe there are two others in this re-
gion, but I have not recently met with them:
yet I have a botanical friend who is much
sterner in the woods than my leisure allows
of, who informs me that he has met two other
species, of which I will procure the fruit if
to be had. I find there is a disposition in
the leaves of the ash when young to increase
the size of its leaflets very much. They are twice,
and sometimes three as broad & twice as long



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
