

Penn Yan July 11<sup>th</sup> 1852

Dr Gray,

Dr Lin.

I this day have forwarded to you by Express a box containing six copies of my *Ceratodon*, part 2. A copy each for Boott, Gay, Hooker, Ward, De Candolle & Klotzsch. I did not know how to direct them all, & request you to fill up the superscriptions & forward them to their destined places as soon as convenient, and would it be asking too much, to drop a few lines to each with my best regards? I also send a small parcel for Tuckerman, which you are requested to hand to him, & in the bottom of the box I have put a small parcel for yourself containing some very nice specimens of *Polygala Lengeleri*. & three or four other things, which I wish you to examine & advise me of the result. — our Express Agent says he cannot take pay to your place, I have therefore paid only to N. York. Whatever charges accrue from N. York to Cambridge I will cheerfully refund. I should like to know whether Klotzsch, or the Royal Herb. at Berlin ever rec'd my first part. Should you be writing to Klotzsch, I wish you would ascertain, we will send this part 2. any time. — In April 1851 I rec'd a letter from H. G. Reichenbach fit. there of Dresden, soliciting an exchange of plants, which I was glad to do, as I have more plants than I know what to do with, I wrote to him complying with his

request, or rather agreeing to do so. In Oct 1851  
I rec'd an answer, stating that he would put up  
a parcel & that it would "leave Europe in the  
beginning or middle of February early." I have not  
heard from him any more & whether he ever sent  
the parcel, I know not. Have you any correspondence  
with him? Is he a scientific botanist?  
Was it from your recommendation that he applied  
to me? His letters are so dated that it bothers  
me very much to understand what he wants.  
I have not succeeded in making the seeds of Sartwellia  
germinate. Should you get any more or prefer the  
cineraria, save me some seeds & I will make another  
trial. If you have any other seeds of rare plants, I should  
be pleased to plant them. Hoping to hear from you  
soon I remain most cordially yours
