My dear Dr Gray,

You have truly a right, I have so long neglected you, to refuse me the favour I am about to ask of you, but I trust to your goodness and to your love of science, and beg leave to request your aid and patronage for a young German naturalist Dr Wunderley. Dr W. is a physician and surgeon and carries with him his case of instruments to practice if necessary; he travels at his own expence and his earnest desire is to visit the Rocky Mountains and there to herborize and zoologize. He has some hopes of being attached to the expedition which the United States are about to send to the Oregon territory. That he will be likely to be useful in such an expedition and promote science it is sufficient for me to tell you that he is a worthy disciple of the celebrated Alexander Braun of Carlsruhe. I will not lose this opportunity of thanking you for the continuation of your most valuable

Flora, which I have regularly received and admired
the active intelligence it displays. I read likewise
with interest the correspondence of your patriarch
Cadwallader with Cronquist & Linnaeus. With what
curious shrewdness he saw through the unequal
system!

The 9th volume of the *Prodromus* will shortly be
published; Decaisne has just finished the *Asclepiadaceae*,
and the printing of the 9th volume has already begun.
They tell me you probably hear from Sir W. Hooker frequent
news of his work since his return
nothing less than an Antarctic Flora. Mr. Hornblow the
surgeon of D'Urville's expedition is publishing the plants they
collected, the plates which have appeared are extremely
beautiful. Gaudichaud is going on with the publication
of the voyage of the Bonite but nothing but the plate
have yet seen the light. Richard is still upon the
Cuba plants. Have you seen Jussieu's elements. It is a
most elegant little book in which all we know or ought to
know is put into the smallest aphoristical compass. I have
not yet seen yours but shall shortly receive them from
London.

I will not add more at present than that all your
friends here learn with pleasure your selection for the botani-
cal cathedral of your ancient university and more
so than my dear Sir
