Dear Professor Gray,

Your kind letter of the 5th ultimo, with the enclosed check of 304 francs has duly reached me. I forwarded the letter immediately to Dr. Bureau at Paris, to cash it, delaying my answer to you until I had received answer from Bureau, which, owing to the slow way of business at the Museum of Paris, only arrived a few days ago. Now everything is settled, and I have noted the amount on your account in the Flora Brasil., as you desired.

The sale of Martius's library has been completed a fortnight ago, and has brought in the sum of 15000 florins. The books you have acquired will probably have been sent to you by Dr. Alujal and the Smithsonian Institution, as I requested. As to the payment, I wrote to the bookseller (Mr. Weigel at Leipzig), to address himself directly to you.

The last consequence of the St. Hayr.
(Cocoobolusaceæ) has now, as I hope, reached
you. I had still much writing about it;
but I trust it will not give so much trouble
in future, as I now have received full
instructions from Dr. Auger.

What I wrote to you the last time
about Auger's death, requires some correc-
tion. It was as natural death, as was at
first believed, but he was murdered in his
bed. Here let us trace been discovered
until now, who might be the criminal,
and which could be the motif of the

The transactions about the sale of
Martius' herbarium are now concluded,
and it will be sent to Brussels in the
course of this summer. The family of
Martius is very glad at this result, as
you may well imagine. They send their
best compliments to you as well as to
Mrs. Gray.

Do you not know, if Dr. Engelmann
has now returned to St. Louis? I wrote
to him already about the end of last
year, but have not yet received any

answer. I had settled with him, ^{as you} know perhaps, definitely about the last year
Brazil.

I hope, Mrs. Gray and you are still
enjoying perfect good health. Pray, pre-
