My Dear Mr. Watson:

In answer to your very kind note, of the 16th instant, which I have just received, I have to say that while I have no knowledge whatever of Judge Cinton's sending to Dr. Thurber a package of Mr. Wright's Cuban Grasses for identification, I distinctly remember that he did procure a suite of Mr. W's Cuban plants. These, excepting the grasses, are now a portion of the Cinton Herbarium, the property of the Buff. Soc. Nat. Sci. I therefore have no doubt that your conjecture as to the way in which the grasses came into Dr. T's hands ^{is correct}.
