My dear Doctor

Pursuing these gentians  
I have reexamined all our Gentians  
the western as well as the eastern  
thoroughly and critically; as also many  
European ones. The first and most  
pleasing discovery is that that Gentian  
Fremontii is identical with the Siberian  
*G. humilis* Sch. of which I have  
specimens of Lebedow; it can not  
be confounded with *G. propinqua*, of  
which I have seen no European species  
however. Another discovery is that  
Grisebach is not absolutely reliable in  
the Prodomus, though vastly superior  
to many other collectors.

*Gentiana tenella*? is certainly  
distinct. I have been able to compare  
specimens from the Alps, Norway, Alaska,  
which all agree in their characters  
and in the difference from our plant  
*G. tenella* is however nearly (— my  
specimens always) 4 parted, not 5 parted  
as Grisebach has it; I have it *G. debilis*  
Gent about, the larger form certainly does  
not deserve that name. I have no other  
specimens in my Herb. and should be obliged  
to you for a fragment of the ordinary  
(smaller?) form of that plant, even if  
only a few flowers; also for a few flowers  
if you can spare them, of *G. propinqua*

which I have never seen. I have spoken  
of Nicollet's collection named so by Torrey;  
but mine at least are *J. tenuis*, not  
propinquus. *J. tenuis* & *J. acutus* are so  
closely allied that they must come close together  
in a systematic arrangement. *J. acutus*  
has also been collected by Hodge and by my  
brother.

The latter has in Utah collected a most  
beautiful little new species which has the  
character of the calyx of *J. campestris* only in  
excess. If it might be named *J. heterophyllum*,  
though that name would designate many other species  
also, but none as well as this.

Another species which I have never seen  
and should like to get for you is  
*J. ochroleuca* var. — X see color

I am a little puzzled about those  
Rocky Mts. Pines. Nobody knows them  
well in those regions, but Parry says he  
has seen it in abundance and sends a  
cone very much like the eastern alba.  
Do you know any they call that tree?  
Only Parry did not get more species  
of his pines, nor fallen ones.

X, I can not conceive how our *Jack*  
*Saponaria* could have been confounded  
with *J. Serrulata*; the teeth of the  
Nita are quite different, and to speak  
of other characters.

*J. Serrulata* & *J. Saponaria* grow  
also in Illinois & here  
*Asclepias speciosa* (Saxifrage)  
— Southern Indiana (and Illinois?)  
*J. ludoviciana* & *J. Saponaria* in Tracy R.M.Y.  
are figured & described — the details.

I can now find only 2 tapoogr. errors in  
"How R. grows" though I thought I had  
seen more.

p. 36 l. 1. orange colored on whitish, or  
or better, orange, yellow, or whitish

p. 69. l. 6 from below petals for stamens

p. 153. l. 5 a " would better read  
few instead of one. I have 5 species on  
the roof of my house all the year round.  
(*N. Op. vulgaris* is not hardy here, while  
*Op. Rafinesquei* is quite so. — Have you  
got Rafi. living? —

I hope you have got back all your  
notes (Parry & Grindelia) communicate  
to me — The number of Bot. Soc. Soc.  
has been received. Many thanks.  
As soon as I have time to pay you  
some money I will also pay  
my installments to Messrs. Associate.

My time is very limited now  
my practice having increased since  
3 months — so that oft not more  
than one hour of daylight can be  
devoted to botany! — But how  
I detest that war! In every  
respect — generally I publicly  
expressed daily.

With first view the general  
destruction of property and life,  
and perhaps worth the general  
demoralization which it brings  
along, and which may not end  
for half a generation or whole one
