He also considers the specific diversity of *L. panicostata* ^(ours) from *L. purpurella* — and now good night and a happy New Year to you and yours!

My dear Gray.

You have not heard from me for a long time. Though not so busy as you, nor able to accomplish so much, my time is occupied more than I wish, partly with mechanical botany, partly with the purchase of my profession and then with the preparations for my trip to Europe. I have leased my house for a long term of years and now bought myself a nice "corner" lot about 2½ miles from the river in a part of the city that is going to be the best and pleasantest, where most ~~lots~~ ^{houses} have garden spots around them — no rows of houses, no stores — a lot of 75 feet front and 125 deep — where I can have a little botanical garden of my own, cultivate all sorts of wild grapes etc etc —

Well, I have arranged & distrib-
uted Parry's collection. There are
245 numbers; of most of them I have
laid out for you two specimens, and
I leave you to settle with Parry
about ~~that~~ your share of the expenses.
The whole numbers 1678 sp. Parry
would probably count more. His
and mine and your two sets and
a set of Grasses for Thurber leave
about 700 duplicates in very unequal
numbers - generally only a few. Whether
I take them with me to Europe or
leave them to Parry will be left
to his decision.

to sort them in the next few days

your *Lemnae* etc. -

Dr Coles gets impatient with my
delay in naming his plants. I have
a word to speak there up and send
them to you. What say you?
I could not go at them before my
return from Europe - and then
then?

Did Kellogg bring any thing from
Wlrossia?

When do you want *Nagis*,
Lemnae and *Wolffii*? Last
term! Braun has not written yet.
I see that Chapm. describes in
his *Flora* a var? of *N. flexilis*,
which from the notice of the seeds
may be the new Albany plant.
I have written to him for a specimen!
I see that he mentions the smooth
shining seed of *N. flexilis*. Why did you
neglect their excellent characters?

I am well satisfied of the diversity
of *V. cordifolia* and *riparia*. The seeds
possess excellent characters. Some of the
riparia now in progress is quite
valuable - if *cordifolia* I know none
