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To explain why I venture to trouble
you with this, let me say that I once
received your papers of a herbarium Boston,
they came, all cut in halves — so that
I had to get people here to gum them
together again! I have no knowledge
of the merchant, but he keeps a little

Dear Doctor

Thank you for your reply.

What led me to undertake an immediate issue of the Cuba Lichens was
your suggestion that it might be done
by n^o, referring to a future publication
of the species. I did not intend to
attach the names to the tickets. Lin-
ding's large coll. is still in the same
state, Nylander having only published
a few new things. I see no objection
to this way, myself: & though I could
with entire satisfaction to myself, now
publish the names of 2/3 of the plants
to be issued, — the other third it would
be risking more or less to venture — the
new species, of which a large part con-
sist, not having been criticised, as they

after to be, before publication, in Europe. nor can I tell when Dr. Blaauw will get over the offence my last paper gave him. It is enough that he had no good reason in the paper, & I solemnly say that he has no other, — but the fact is that he has wholly discontinued his correspondence, since the angry appeal ag^t my unfortunate memoir, & left the various business matters between us, with a large balance against him, wholly without settlement. So I cannot tell when I may once more have the benefit of his knowledge; though (unconscious of any reason to the contrary) I look

for a letter by every mail.

In this state of things there is a good deal which I shall not care to risk the publishing of. But when the work of putting up the specimens is in hand, I may decide to name all, or at least the new things; writing, which I prefer to pointing.

May I ask you to order the tickets for me, according to the specimen sent, & the no. given in my last?

And will you, to prevent the possibility of mistake, kindly help me so far as to look at, & take for me the many ^{I send, and} pages of the quality which you approved, at P. C. Jones's, Water St. Boston, to be sent, with bill, collected on delivery, by Express, to me at New Mark.
