

D Dray gave me a few mosses from Hobart town - among which were several interesting species but I suppose you have all from that quarter - I have largely from that part of the world given me by Dr. W. H. Harvey & Mr. Wilson.

I have just examined and determined the mosses collected by Edw. Palmer M.A. at Guadalupe Island off the coast of California. Among them I detected some so interesting that I enclose 3 specimens ~~two~~ at least one new to this continent.   
The Bartrula rigida var pilifera this variety has not heretofore been reported it is unquestionably that variety - Tortula (Bartrula) atrovirens Sm. is new - It has so many synonyms - Mitten carries it back to Smith's Eng. Botany, when it was first named under Grimmia atrovirens - The Bartrula name is a good thing - The other plants are Grimmias, Tortulas, etc.

My dear Sir

I am pleased to have your welcome letter of the 30<sup>th</sup> ult. We seem to understand each other with regard to the work to be done in bringing out a Synopsis of the Mosses of this Country. I shall do my best throughout the work. The purpose of submitting all to European Authorities will be a good thing - I think that many of Austin's new species will be ignored under such a test as the critical eyes of Schimpff and Viret. I hold myself in readiness to set to work when I get the first consignment or order from you. I purpose on Saturday of going with part of my family to make about two weeks visit to Philad. and I am not sure but that I shall have to go to Chicago Ills. on the 8<sup>th</sup> Sept. I am and have been the Treasurer of the American Pomological Society for twenty five years, and the Association is

to meet at that time at Chicago.)

You have stated very precisely how the Synopsis should be gotten out. I like the plan in every particular and am fully convinced that no one but yourself is capable of doing the work properly. I submitted your letter to Dr. Gray and he said after reading it 'Well' - the plates he thinks those used in his manual can be had or if lost he would hold the publisher of his Manual responsible and cause them to make good the loss. He remarked that the figures were too crowded and contrasted - that Schimpff had improved upon them. I cordially approve of the suggestion that we prepare all things quiet by ourselves for certain Austin would be tempted to forestall our work otherwise I would not apply to Austin just yet to prepare a Synopsis of the Hepaticae - How does he stand in the estimation of foreign authors of Hepaticae?

I have no idea of publishing a Synopsis of Mosses myself - I have finely entertained the thought that now when you publish it we should have a complete work. As to a co-operation with Austin or any other party, to Dr. Gray I recommended all such a connection and I told him that I would not join any one in this matter but yourself - What extent of Country did Mr. Sullivant purpose to embrace in his Synopsis? Only the United States embracing Alaska? or did he intend to take in Canada and the British Provinces?

I can fully appreciate the visit you enjoyed at Prof. Porter's - I have had much pleasure on my repeated visits to his domain - I divided the collection of mosses by Dr. Kidder at Kerguelan Island made during his observations of the transit of Venus last autumn in six or more parcels and as Dr. Gray mentioned their destination I suggested that one be sent to you - I made 2 new Grimmia's
