My Dear Mr Watson

Your last
contribution to American Botany
kindly sent me was duly received
and enjoyed for which accept
my thanks. I see in it my
last new Minimus, but not
the ~~two~~ sent you in '89 & again in
'90. Have they been published yet?
If not and if the original specimens
are not at hand, I can send
you some new ones this fall
when I shall have another small
package to send you, among
them another new Minimus, at
least new to me. It may be in E. &
Greene's list which I did not have
but is not in the Botany & Cal. I also
see ~~some~~ indications of still another
between Manns & Ferreyi which I hope
to make clear another season

This is emphatically the nature
of the germs. One reason
why I have found so many
is the exceedingly transitory nature
of most of them, which makes it
easy for them to escape the notice
of the merely occasional explorer.
