I am out of the college at last and at home on the ranch, making some botanical collections. Looking over letters of my correspondents and hoping to get back to the point of interest I had gained before I was obliged to work for the college.

In reading again your letters carefully I find much to aid me in making up my collection of ferns for our "Society of Natural History".

When I get on California ferns made up. Then I will try to get a collection of North American ferns.

I do not know that I ever acknowledged yours of Dec. 23. 1876 and thank ed you for the kind information about cards, papers for drying &c. all of which has been of service to me. I am now making

up a collection of algae for Mrs.

Poy.

I notice what you say about *Noth-*
oloma candida and *N. Parryi*, and
will try to procure them.

You were the first one to call my at-
tention to the fact that *Capillus-*
Veneris was a different species from
A. Ciliatus. I now see the difference
at a glance.

I am glad to know that *Polypodium*
californicum and *integerrimum* are one and the same.
If you have a specimen of *Aspidium*
aculeatum to spare I would like
to compare it with *Aspidium*
argutum that we have so much
of.

The *Aspidium Novboracense* that
I sent and which you returned got
in the collection by mistake. It does
not grow here, but had been sent
to me by Mrs. Ritchie a great lover
of friends in Philadelphia.

Cheilanthes californica, *Adiantum*
Chilense, and *Capillus Veneris*, *Pellaea*
andromedifolia, and *Aspidium*

Patens. I can send you plenty of
although the latter do not grow in
abundance in Santa Barbara.

The *Cheilanthes cooperae* is a poor
specimen I have been trying to keep
alive and yet to grow three plants
one of them I have pressed and
dried for Prof. Eaton, one I intend
for you. The third I thought
I would let stand. It is
rare in Santa Barbara and
when found is of poor quality.
After the next rains I will make
an effort to get more roots of this
fern so as to fulfill my promise to
you.

I should have been pleased to meet
with Miss Emily B. Peltier. Is she
now in California?

My collection was much enriched
by the parcel you sent me so
much so that I am made un-
tilous to make up a full collec-
tion of the North American species.

I have a good many foreign
species. Among them about
seventy from the Sandwich
Islands. Enclosed you will
