


Los Angeles Cal. Nov 16th 1883

Dear Sir:

Permit me to submit several ^{plants} mailed today, to you for your inspection and to request the favor of your decision as to the diagnosis of *Hypericum Kalmanianum* L (from Arkansas!) or is it *H. prolificum* v. *densiflorum*? — Aster — this I sent as *A. ptarmicoides* var *Georgianus* to the late Prof. A. Gray, but it was designated by him as *A. exilis*. S Chapman however, to whom specimens of it were also sent, made placed it under *Heterophyllum* and made it an unusual and depauperate form of *A. Azureus* (The rays in the fresh plant are pure white and turn bluish in drying.)

Hypericum lobocarpum, Göttinger, I enclose as from a new locality (was sent to Dr. Göttinger as *H. cyclofolium* and by him erected) also as probably from a new range *Habenaria Unalascensis* from the foothills near Los Angeles.

The *Lycium* was referred to Mr. E. L. Greene, who recognized it as a new species and had the kindness to name it.
