Dear Mr Watson

With this I send
you another lot of plants
of my collection for this
year. I suppose these will
~~not~~ be reported on until
Dr. Gray returns, as they
are mostly Gamopetalae.

No 734 ^{Sidalcea} appears to be strictly
dioecious, but it was just
coming in flower when I
was there, later on it may be
monoecious

No 738 Symphoricarpos - Is
this S. mollis.

No 739, This grows in the

gravelly beds of streams, it
is very vivid and has the odor
of some of the Labiateae. There
is another species of it there
but it was not in flower and
I did not get it

No. 740-742. *Grindelia*. Is there
one or three species here?

No 743 Grows with No. 739.

No. 751, *Blepharipappus* — ? This
is very different from *B. scaber*,
as it grows in Eastern Oregon,
most conspicuously by its
flowers not closing in sundown,
but remaining open all day, even
in bright weather

No 752. This is the finest *Madia*
of the whole lot, it appears to be
a new species

No 762 *Specularia* — ? I can
not find anything like this

described in the books that I
have. It grows on brushy hillsides.

This is all the notes that I
made on this collection.
