I sent you last evening  
a specimen of the doubtful fern which  
I brought from the Ute pass. I could  
not then find the one I wanted to send  
you, but to day my clerk has found it  
I send you <sup>from a clump</sup> a frond which I had wet  
and pressed. I have examined it as  
closely as I know how with my old eyes  
and I cannot make it out as anything  
but *Ch. lanuginosa*. On removing the  
tomentum the margin seems to me to be  
recurved. The hairs are jointed or as Eaton  
says about *lanuginosa* "articulated". In short  
it seems to me a small growth of  
*C. lanuginosa* - There are two points that  
seem to favor *N. Pamji* - The black  
spermytes and the dense covering above  
of entangled hairs -

It is wonderful how well Eatons descrip-  
of Ch. laevis in Ferns of N. A. agrees with  
Dr Parry's of N. Parryi in Ann Nat Vol 9 June  
1875.

I would like very much to see an  
undoubted frond of ~~the~~ N. Parryi

Shall I trouble you to return  
this frond as it belongs to a clump  
that I have pressed for my herbarium
