engraving in Amherst, Mass

from the original Agnew's type
which is dated 1855. They
must also have been
made from the same specimen
by corner. That was when
Agnew's types were in vogue,
as this is one - (I am so
fortunate as to own it)
and it is a beautiful
piece of work - and was
copied many times -
There was this in Opaloon
Crimm Monthly - our in
Annual of Scientific Discovery,

in the American Geologist,
and several others - Most of
them are from 1854-56 -
I think therefore it would
be safe to date it 1854, as
the original is likely to have
been made then - My
brother Charles in Honolulu,
looked up all he could
find about it, but there
was no special dates that
he could lay hands on -
When you come up to
Northampton I will show
you some things that

least like mine - but that
is all the better - The
figure is good, and the
botanical very excellent!

Will you kindly remember
me most cordially to Mrs.
Drane - also to Dr. Gooden
and Dr. Fernald. I will
also see Dr. Robinson too, as
I was so greatly indebted to him
for showing me all over the
Gray Herbarium - I want to go
