Your
favors of 11th & 14th insts & the
package of ferns were duly
rec'd.

I am very much obliged
for the specimens sent me
& your kindness in giving me
the information I desire as to
the classification of *C. elegans*
& *C. myriophylla* is fully appre-
ciated. I have not had time
to look at the *elegans* again,
but as soon as I receive your
next letter with the promised
myriophylla, of which I have
now no root specimen, I shall

be glad to study the plants
carefully in the light of your
letters.

I put up for you yesterday,
I have sent by express to-day,
the ferns you desired. I sent
in each case the best speci-
mens I could & regret that
I had not in all cases good
botanical specimens to send.
As far as I was able I sent
specimens showing the different
developments & forms of growth
of the plants as I found them.
Pellaea Wrightiana I have never
found abundant in southern
Calif. & taking all I saw in
my travels, I got but little.
The Adianta are without roots

but otherwise good. I had no
root specimen of *Pellaea Bridgesii*
& the *Aspidium munition* sent
will be of little or no value to
you. The last two species I
collected when I had no botan-
ical interest & I have parted
with the best & nearly all of *A.*
munition. The better developed
fronds of this plant had longer
& narrower pinnae, placed very
obliquely on the rachis, crowded
& imbricated & I could not
press the rigid frond so that
& it would not show the fruit
from both sides. Am sorry I could
not send you any of it. A root
specimen of this form of *A. mu-
nition* is, I presume, what you
wanted. I have plenty of the
typical *munition*.
