My dear Miss Carr :-

Thank you for the "haircaps" which came in due season. I would be glad to get specimens of the common species if you have a good opportunity to collect them when they are in good condition.

Fresh specimens will be satisfactory if that is the most convenient way for you to send them, but after the first of June you had better let them dry before you send them, as I expect to be away most of the time from early June to the middle of September, and things sent during that time might remain in the wrappers until I reach home again. First class mail matter will, however, be forwarded.
