

Wethersfield Sept 9th 1852

Dear Sir

I reached home yesterday I have been
much longer on the way than I expected to be
I received your last letter while on my
way in from El Paso to San Antonio It is encour-
aging to me that of all the ~~different~~ ^{various} packages that
at different times I have sent you as yet none have
been lost But I have been particularly unlucky
in my attempts to send seeds to my brother - yet you
think I do love to grumble You think Col. Graham
has been distributing about to yourself & others over
sent to my brother with his ^{knowledge} ~~knowledge~~ & consent
and in his care Yet he has not rec'd the first one
Now have I not cause to grumble? But nimport I'll
be as good natured as I can

The collection of this year were sent by Adam's
express from New Orleans to Dr Torrey The cactaceae
were taken by me to St Louis and turned over to
Dr Engelmann We made out about forty species
I spent two or three days very pleasantly with the
Dr — Do you hear from Sullivan? I want to get
from him a set of my Texas mosses & Hepaticae for
reference so that I may not go on collecting duplicate
triplicates &c — also the same from Tuckerman
with respect to the Lichens These will make small
packages & can be easily carried and will materially
assist me in studying these families

I wrote to Dr Torrey from St. Louis and expected to find here a letter from him but was disappointed. I shall go to New York soon. I have turned over by Maj Emory's order triplicates of my Spring's collection to Dr Torrey - as also Mr Bigelow's Parry's those found on my way in are not divided. My reservation I will forward to you if you desire it. You can take what you want & dispose of the rest as you have hitherto done. I fear however they will contain few or no novelties.

Please send me the sheets of such portions as you are working up for publication I saw in St Louis your account of our Melocactus (Bebiana) We ~~had~~ found several small & very pretty Gilias on the hills at Frontiers last Spring.

Dr Engelmann lends by me two books for you one on the Cactaceae the other on the Orchidaceae. Shall I send them by mail?

I have been contributing something lately to Mr Curtis' family. I have just got a letter from him in form of a report on those last sent in which are some "Nov. sp?" some "Buchs" as he calls them but says "never mind the Nitsch. I collect many of them myself but they are only to be determined under the microscope." Write me soon.
