days clearing away the broken

or useless wheel & came on
with one & sails - made a
long passage to St. Thomas
Mr. L. is thin - did not have
good health in France - but
cote for him. He is gaining -
is rejoiced to be home again
(he is at home here you know - as
well as at M. Vendy) & is cheerful
He talks of going to our country
if he gets quite well - goes in
two or three days to St. F.
I think of staying a little while
here, or at Charles Descaillies
near here to look for some
things at the farallones especially
Melocactus for Dr. E.

On my way from Bayam 2
turned aside & spent two weeks
at Bradford. Found a few good
things on La Guineas & Loma
del Yabo. besides some shells

& bird

With Mr. L's help I hope to
penetrate farther to the east-
ward from M. F. than I have
yet been able to do. I shall
get introductory letters too
which will facilitate my
visits to other points so that
I hope to make the winter pro-
fitable for Cotnam as well as
Zoblogy
