Dear Dr Ames.

Herewith the few plants promised at my last writing. 365 & 369 were dried by hot iron & neither very successfully. The possibilities are obviously great & I hope to acquire a reasonable proficiency for the next results of my collecting.

We are installed here till the 1st of Feb & have then to make another move, these quarters tho' fairly pleasant, are very cramped & I have no room to myself, we are opposite the remains of Carnegie's "Peace Palace" ruined by the earthquake of 1910 a few walls on the date fixed for the opening ceremony & its gaunt remains are being ground up, by an electrically driven stone-crusher, into road metal for the streets of Cartago, our ways, therefore, should be ways of peace.

Tho' I beg forgiveness for the weakness of these specimens I trust some may prove of interest & use.
