Dear Dr. Ames,

A letter by today's mail from CWP provoked me to send you a word of greeting & good cheer for 1923 — the following rambling remarks.

Masdevallia Livingstonei — Do you know Roegh's story?

If I bore you with an old tale, herewith apologies. However history hath it, that crossing the isthmus he had to wait for a train at Calleca, & naturally explored the surrounding jungle, finding there to his astonishment a masdevallia, which eventually reached home & were put up to auction at Stevens, the very day on which news ^{the plants} of Livingstone's death arrived. & that accounts for the dedication (of which Reck seemed unaware; by the by, CWP sent me yours with photo, here this second)

There is little doubt of CWP's plant.: I have told him of Roegh's locality. It is undoubtedly an unusual station for masdevallia, yet the Pleurothallidæ are great in zonal range. Small inconspicuous forms occur at sea level here:

I have made you a few specimens will beg your indulgence for the scrappy nature of some of them. You will understand that ^{one} small plant is often my only stock & I offer you only the inflorescence & a single leaf perhaps; if at a later time better ones are possible they shall follow as duplicates. Among these, are, *Pleurothallis grandis* (Roegh) *Chondrorhyncha altida* (Roegh) *Oreidium wasenae* (Reck) a hotyelia, ^{two, one} very fresh, masdevallia, an Epidendrum, closely allied to what I know as *E. splendidum*

from a different region & of more compact growth, *Arenaria
immersa*.

The hedgerows round Cartago are bright in many places with Epis radicans & when this frequent stone walls covered with Bryophyllum in bloom the effect is very charming. I have often tried the pollen of radicans on Cartago but have never had a ripe capsule, this year one on C Duranta progressed very well until a prolonged spell of wet brought the usual dose of Anthracnose along.

May I thank you again for the splendid equipment you sent. I am most grateful for it, it fills a long felt want.
