My dear Dr Ames.

My warmest thanks for yours of May 28th, I have acknowledged already the famous list of determination for which I am very deeply grateful.

On Friday last I had the pleasure to take two botanists for a short woodland ramble (Dr Stevens of Illinois & Mr Stark, late of Cornell) & I took opportunity to go to a haunt of two of your desiderata, Masdevallia cyathogastra & M. picturata, of the first I found 3 small plants in flower & of the latter 4 or 5 nice plants, though several of the flowers were much eaten, of this a good one is safely & thoroughly alcoholized for you.

The episode of the epiphytic Spiranthes is good reading & I congratulate you on the skill & so successfully attaining such a prize; showed this occur down here?

Of species in cultivation for you, the supposed Epidendrum purpureum is full of buds, the Eriopsis spike is up about 10 inches & bears just over 30 buds some of which are stationary & evidently are "damping off" at least so are quite healthy & indicate a small-flowered species, the supposed "Calanthe" has flowered & is nothing of the sort but rather a Microstelis or allied genus, the whole plant & flowers a uniform green, the petalous petals purple also alcoholized for you.

I am projecting a raid tomorrow for Scaphygethes Eichler, but bright rain. the prospect of more to follow will render it a difficult matter, as it is a long trudge up to 7000 ft

I imagine Guanacaste should be worth working & I may get down there at the end of the rain, if Otto's friend Valerio

is collecting on the Tilarán range, as I believe, you should find many novelties among his ~~material~~^{material}, or at least many northern forms may stray down to that region, which is close to the Nicaraguan frontier.

Enclosed picture is of a Stanhopea brought down from Parapiquí some ten years ago. I sent a good piece of it to Kew, but heard nothing of it, it is evidently a natural hybrid, the epichile is typically ecomata yet note the stubby horns, I believe a piece is still alive at Les Coquées (the farm) & it must be brought over here & nursed. in any case it is a charming thing. I tried when at home to get new slides for the camera that took apposed picture, they are no longer ~~made~~^{obtainable}, the makers name is Gennert of New York, it has been in my possession for 26 years & was then not new, so it may be the original camera; are the heirs & assigns of said Gennert in business? I would like to get hold of 3 slides as my other $\frac{1}{4}$ plat Kodak of a very pre-war vintage is quite unsuitable for flower work.

There are two buds on a Cycnoches from Peralta, all my pet cockroaches must be grinding their teeth.
