It was a great pleasure to see you and Miss Brown once more. You appeared in fine health and in good spirits which condition is as it should be.

I enjoyed my evening with you very much and only regret we did not have an opportunity to see more of you.

I am enclosing my latest list of bird notes trusting they may be of some interest to you or your friends who are bird lovers.

We reached the Moyne last night, received on board the Oceanographic party and are now scouting to the Northwest along the East Slope of the Grand Bank for ice bergs.

It has been a lonely trip since leaving Boston Monday last. Fine clear smooth weather all the way - & day is no exception. This is very unusual I can assure you.

I am well and in good spirits but will be glad when the patrol is over for the season and I can return home to my little family.
