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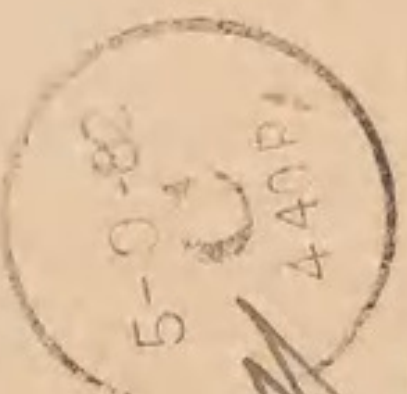

Dear friend; Thanks for your communication respecting *Sammon's fern*. Pity there is so little dependence to be placed on his localities given. I hope to find *Ch. villosa*, however, was getting ready to return to Arizona, when this terrible Indian war broke out. Being well out of danger, I don't propose to run into it. Have just returned from 18 days tour principally in Lower Cal. Nothing of special interest to you to report. I want to show my bag about this *Ophioglossum*, which I collected with Dr. Perry 80 miles south of here in L.C. In mature specimen normally two stalks, whose sterile fronds, branching from the fertile at the surface of the soil, spread in opposite directions; fertile spikes so acute; rootstock so thick; how can it be an *O. vulgatum*?

On our L. Cal. trip Jones behaved shamefully (worse than Dr. P. and he turned back, while I went further with my assistants) and will earnestly dispute Dr. Perry's facts for him. So how minded, excited, pig-headed, ill-mannered, poor thing! C. G. Pringle, Colton, Cal.
