Dear Mr. Davenport.

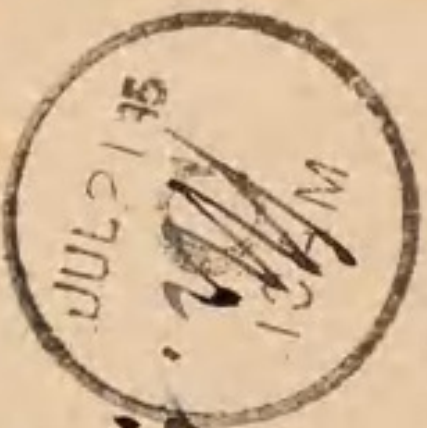
Your saying in the note which I found here on my return two weeks ago, that you should write me more at length in a few days, caused me to delay announcing my safe arrival. Thus I joined in long-making, and since then have scarcely written a letter. I want to relieve your anxiety about me.

I have got through with a thorough course of medicine which has I trust cleared me of the last seeds of malaria; and now after four or five weeks of rest I feel as well as usual, and hope very soon to be on my way back to my field of work. From August to December is the best of the year there; and I hope to secure much more than my spring hunt. I want to meet the expectations of botanists, and I could never be content without making at least one good season in Mexico. My call has not come home yet.
