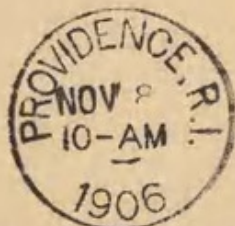


Dear Deane, 6 Cushing St, Prov, Nov 7,
