My Dear Deane: It is most kind of you to
give me the *Carex faenea*. I appreciate
it, I assure you.

Suppose your young lady grows fuchsia,
Petunia (from seeds), tulips or *ixias* (from bulbs), *Schiz-*
opetelon & *alys-sium* (from seeds). ^{6 in a pot} If she could
get some bulbs or roots of *axalis* she would find
them interesting if she has a bright-sunny
place. Common bush beans do well
in winter in a warm window. *Pelargoniums*
are very much mixed and you would not
be likely to trace the species. Any of the
forcing bulbs are nice, like *Chionodoxa*, ^{in moss} *Crocus*,
nerine, *babiana* and the like. You will ^{best} get
quickest ^{right style} results from *Schizopetum*. It needs
a rather cool place.
