I send by this mail a plant that came to me from Boston for a name. Where collected, I don't know. I think it looks like a *Stellaria*, and if so it may be *S. longipes*, - it has not quite the aspect of *S. longifolia*, and doesn't answer the description either. What should you say? The petals that I soaked became so soft and pulpy that I could not smooth them out to see if they were entire or parted, but I don't think it is an *Arenaria*.
