from town for one to walk out and do any thorough work and return to town <sup>in a day</sup> but if one would get board with one of the Madaket farmers he could explore the whole west end of the island - Pot's Hills, the two sides of the pond, and the north beach for a long distance. I feel sure there interesting discoveries would be made.

Of course I meant the right genus for that Aster, but I had not the late manuals at hand, and wrote out of my own head without consideration! I suppose I write more carelessly to you than I should to a beginner; I know that an error, if I commit one will not lead you astray, and also that you will not condemn me as an ignoramus if I do make a little slip - it is the beginners who
