I can hardly hope to offer
anything new to your herbarium, so
nearly complete for the region that it
embraces, still Grevillea arvensis, L.
is not very common and is small
so, on a venture. I found a little patch
of it under a tree ^{a fortnight ago,} in the Cañon — my
two hands would cover it — and have been
watching it for fruit ever since. I don't believe
it is going to form any. Except for that
lack the specimens are good.

When you reply will you tell me
how rare Lilaea simplex or Vaillantii
is. The land form, which makes such a
beautiful green sod? I have in mind a
paper for Rhodora on Oakes's report of
it in Nantucket, but I don't want to

make too much of a plan that is fairly
common. I am late about getting to
Nantucket this year, but hope to sail
before the middle of June -
