My dear Sir

I am sorry that both your letters
have arrived at a time when I cannot satisfac-
torily answer either of them - being absent from
home during the summer vacation, and not
expecting to reach Dublin before the middle
of October. I hope that this delay will not
prevent your introducing Coulter's new Mono-
gymnos into your Flora. There are several which
you may not have received, but I have kept
no account of what I have sent you. I think
therefore that the better way will be for me
to forward to you the set belonging to the College,
that you may have a full set of the best
specimens before you to describe from. Having
undertaken to give names to & describe the
whole of Coulter's plants in a publication con-
nected with the Herbarium I do not wish the
new ones to be published in Silliman's Journal,
but you are quite at liberty to introduce the

whole of them into your flora - giving names to the new species in our joint names "Harr. & Gray" - and this, as well as those which I have already given names to, as in those that remain unexamined.

You doubtless have specimens of both the new genera of Scrophulariace - but at this moment I cannot refer you to them. Possibly a description from memory will enable you to make them out.

One - which I had intended to call Bergenia virgata
J. F. Bergin Esq., M.R.I.A. of Dublin
(after a particular friend of Coulter's, and a well deserving scientific man - a great lover of plants, though not much of a botanist) - is a twiggy shrub - with straight branches, small leaves, and small, axillary flowers. The specimens are tips of branches. - The other - unnamed - has dark colored Digitalis or Pentstemon-like flowers in a terminal raceme, and lance-shaped leaves. - In the Appendix to the Scrop. in D.C.

Bentham has named several others.

On my return to Dublin I shall employ the first leisure I can command in examining Coulter's California plants & completing the paper which I commenced nearly two years ago, & which has been unloshed at since. Best

I shall not detain the Monoptala for this, but forward them to you direct - via New York. As there are no Steam Packets to Boston, this will be the better place. - Bentham is travelling in Europe & will be absent from England for 2 or 3 years probably.

I fear that I have very few Cape Mosses remaining. My bundles of duplicates have been mislaid in one of my three removals, and the bulk of my stock of Wardia & several of the more interesting species lost. I was even obliged to beg a specimen of Wardia from the College Library! I shall have pleasure in sending Mr. Sallmann specimens of all that remain, as well as a few Indian Mosses from Dr. Wallish - but I am very little of a Muscologist, & have forgotten most of what I know. Of course Mr. S. is in correspondence with Mr. Wilson our best Muscologist, and has from him our British mosses? - The copy of Musci Alpinissimi will be very welcome to me, and I owe you many thanks for laying it aside for me. I hope you receive a copy for yourself. - I also owe you much for the warm way in which you have taken up my request to have American Seaweeds. Through your

assistance I now hope to be able to sketch out a decent "Phycologia Americana". There is no country of such extent & so accessible, of whose Alga we know so little. I look forward, you may guess, with much interest to the receipt of your parcel. Please to address it to "The Director of the Museum, Trinity College, Dublin" -
