"My Dear Hanan"

I wrote a few days ago by the "Crocus" steamer, round the Horn, telling of my arrival here of the sad news that awaited me in poor Harry Fisher's death. Since then we have heard the result of the inquest which was held yesterday as I had supposed it would be - a "No-cause" (who was a fellow passenger of Harry in the "Marco Polo") has since come to town & I have conversed with him about Harry. He was a very intimate with Harry both Alfred Webb saw him almost immediately after his death was discovered, before he died, was quite cold - They had all been together for the last time on the steamer before Harry died, as well as usual in very good spirits, remarkably pleasant - They parted late in the evening of the death occurred following Tuesday night - there was no sign of pain or struggle - the appearance was as if he had passed away as a quiet sleep - the expression of the face was described as being beautiful and like one dead, continued for the two days that elapsed before his interment - He has been buried at Port Fairy where they to go over a few days - I have taken passage in a little vessel which was to have sailed to day but whose sailing is put off so do not expect to get there before next week - I am going to a Mr. Howes there, who was very kind to Harry when he invited me to his house - We were about ordering a tombstone here but were querying about the charge for the very simplest stone with only his name, place of residence, date of birth and death - £15 - which I think being high to be willingly paid with Mr. Robinson I prefer it better to procure a slab nicely cut from home & shall not be finally laying the grey bluestone of Melbourne of branching off various places & returning to his quarter here for 6 months or perhaps longer - I think that probably might like to have something more than three names & date cut on the stone, a fact that I might wish it to be removed & replaceable - The work at home is somewhat dearer here but even with a high freight it will not be much expensive. Shall be in touch

way more satisfactory - You may tell Lydia that I have proposed this, that I authorize Thomas to have the stone cut at my expense according to whatever pattern she may desire - It should be very securely packed & forwarded by way of Hobartson & Co. to arrive either I shall see it taken charge of, or W. Hawes or Dr. Mesurier, both you know live at Port Fairy who feel very sincerely for poor Harry's memory, will see that everything is properly done - + + + + + + +

I have made a great friend here with Dr. Muller the Govt. Botanist an excellent fellow good observer - He has placed all his Algae at my disposal & given me much information besides of a local character, also given me duplicates of his rare plants collected among the mountains of the interior where I cannot afford to travel - He spends 4 or 5 months every year in duty collecting in the interior of the Colony & I am to share in all his future duplicates.

I dined last Sunday with Robert Russell & his wife, who have a very pretty place the beautiful garden (in which I picked wall-flowers, violet, primroses, periwinkle, rose afloat to touch) They live about two miles from town, of the land by the Yarra which flows round 3/4 of their land - The cost of the house about £1250 full purchase money, & now they are ready set it for £1800 per annum - They turn over £2000 a year net by the sale of fruit & the milk of 11 cows for which they readily get 1/8 of guinea - They had 2 1/4 tons of Cherries last year, just now the old pines are very beautiful, darker timber from Belfast - Dan promises gooseberries &c &c - Mrs. R. is a very pleasant wife & her hospitable woman, has a bed for me if I chose to occupy it, but the room backwards forward would be too troublesome & expensive - Cap't Blithorn has a steamer (keeps a lodger house) & I may possibly visit him on my return - John Phelps is gone to Adelaide on route to Europe - he dined with me at St. Kts - + + + + +

"Yesterday the first railway was opened here from the city to the beach - The distance is about 2 miles, the fare is 1/- The locomotive was made here, but the passenger carriages were sent from England" - &c

"18th " As my little vessel has again put off sailing till Saturday next 28th - I intend going tomorrow to Geelong returning on Friday afternoon - Cap't Blithorn & A. F. Alexander keep a boarding-house there, & I mean to put up with them for 3 nights - I shall thus see whether that neighbourhood be worth my visiting on my return from Belfast - Meantime I shall post this letter on the mail day uncertain as to All well"
