My dear fracy

bringing all your sundry parcels. I  
let me thank you for Bot. of Sp. &c.  
& more for the promised Atlas of plates,  
when they come. I must send the sheets  
to the Binder before I can look further  
at them. - 2<sup>d</sup>. I am quite willing to pay  
on ac<sup>t</sup> of T. C. D. for Fendler's Collection, the  
ferms of which I have turned over, & appraise  
the specimens much - £7.8.0 to your Cr<sup>d</sup>.  
but how is it to be paid? Shall I have  
it to T. H. Todhunter, who has still a small  
balance of 12/ to your Credit, & a page open  
in your name - or shall I remit it, or  
pay it to any one else. Let me know. - 3<sup>d</sup>.  
I have examined & named Dr. Morrow's Japan  
Algae & enclose the list. Will you tell him  
that I am much obliged to him for them. Are  
they all for me? or some to be returned? Of  
some species there are many duplicates - of  
others solitary specimens. I expected to find  
some Fucoids, of which the old collector Tilesius  
& Thunberg found many curious kinds at  
Japan - but there are none. I hope Wright  
has collected them.



My parcels of Algae for America are  
all ready to send, I have been so for  
a month past - only my dilatoriness  
has prevented them being forwarded.  
I shall tell the parties to pay you  
the money & send you a list. I shall  
put in a parcel for D. Sartwell in  
exchange for his Carices - a small  
one as you propose. In fact I have  
a very rich collection of N. American  
Carices, so shall not break my heart  
if he refuse my offer. I think I have  
most of the species, including Drummond's  
Arctic ones.

You need not caution me. I am not over-  
worked - I have done wonderfully little  
all the winter. I was laid up for a month  
& idled greatly. Now that I am at work, it  
goes on slowly. I have just finished Tasmanian  
Algae, with 12 quarto plates for Hooker. I am  
now sorting Phaeophyta - & arranging Herbarium.  
When the day, yet a little longer I shall  
resume Her. Bor. Amer. I be glad when it  
is done, as I am quite as much tired of it  
as you can be of Flora. When will you send  
back my Corolliflora? Yours ever
