

A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF FLORISTICS IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA: ADDENDUM NUMBER 1

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A bibliography of floristics in southern California was published in *Crossosoma* Volume 24, Numbers 1 and 2, 1999 (for Spring-Summer and Autumn-Winter 1998). At that time, it was realized that some important references might have been overlooked, and that subsequently, many more that are pertinent to floristics in southern California would be published each year. It was hoped that at least once a year an addendum could be published in *Crossosoma* to bring the bibliography up to date.
